DISPUTE ABOUT REAL ESTATE

The Subject of a Good Deal of Talk last Evening.

Last evening a joint meeting of the board of education committee on buildings and grounds and the council committee on real estate was held to consider the subject of a city lot leased to a colored woman named Henderson, and wanted by the board of education, to be used as a playground for Lincoln school, which it adjoins.

It developed that the board of education committee had not deliberately ignored the city council and its committee, as on the face of things it seemed to have. The committee understood that Mrs. Henderson held a lease on the ground, and supposed it could be transferred like any other lease.

In reference to Tenth street, Dr. Diekey, president of the board, said the street was really improved by the erection of the wall. It was suggested by City Solicitor White that unless some formal action as to the use of the street was taken and entered of record, there might be trouble in the future.
