THE INTELLIGENCER'S popular trips, of which an outline was given yesterday morning, bring the transportation to Chicago and return and a week's lodging and board there, with all other necessary expenses, within the most limited means. In fact, by this arrangement it is cheaper to go to Chicago than to stay home.

Mr. Hart returned yesterday from Chicago, where he visited the different hotels at which rates are offered and they are all guaranteed to be comfortable, good houses, convenient to the fair. Of course, nobody, almost, returns to his hotel for lunch, and few do for the evening dinner, but those who wish to do so can make arrangements for dinner at any of the hotels.
