The Greatest Rush to the World's Fair Yet Seen,

MOSTLY BY INTELLIGENCER PLAN.

People Cannot be Deterred from Going and they Soon Discover the Best Way to Get There and Stay There Comfortably—Three States Represented in the Departures Booked Yesterday by the Intelligencer.
