Cloture in the Senate. At last Senator Voorhees comes forward with a cloture resolution, providing that after a measure has been debated for thirty days debate may be cut off and a vote had.

It is Senator Voorhees' position of leader on the side that is supposed to be the majority side politically that gives great importance to his move. It is reasonable to suppose that he has counted noses and ascertained that he has the vote to carry through the new rule.

It does not touch the merits of the case to suggest, as has been done by some Republicans, that this rule of cloture would enable the Democrats to pass through the senate the repeal of the national election laws and the protective tariff laws.

Democratic Scheming in Ohio. Mr. J. H. Shinn, of Friendly, Tyler county, sends the INTELLIGENCER a Washington dispatch published in the Register of November 11, 1892. This dispatch is of peculiar interest at this time, for it tells of a sort of "ghouliah glee" how the Democrats played their little game in Ohio in the campaign of last year, when they came near sweeping the state out of the Republican column.

The scheme was set up by Mr. Neal, now Democratic nominee for governor, and Ex-Governor Campbell. What it was is best told in the Register's own "special telegram." This way the story runs:

Governor Campbell, who was in New York, gave it his opinion that Ohio might be carried on a still hunt if the Democratic national committee could spare the money. Mr. Neal was summoned to New York and agreed with Mr. Campbell. The plan was settled on that the Democrats should on the surface do nothing in Ohio, thus lulling the Republicans into a false confidence. But in the country districts trusty Democratic workers should a few days before the election be provided with money to get every Democratic voter to the polls.

When election day came large numbers of Republicans in the rural districts did not take the time to go to the polls, confident the state was sure to give Harrison about the usual majority. But every Democratic vote was got to the polls and Ohio was swept out of the Republican column for the first time in thirty years.

"The bearing of this observation lies in the application of it." There is no Democratic hope of the election of Mr. Neal, but the Ohio Democrats will exert themselves to the utmost to hold down Governor McKinley's majority.
