### Died of Diphtheria.

Yesterday morning at 6:15 Christian W., son of Louis Zoekler, died at his home in the North End. This young boy was one of the many victims of diphtheria, which is prevalent in this city at the present time. The funeral takes place this morning at 10 o'clock.

### New Baltimore & Ohio Engine.

On Wednesday a fine new passenger engine was received at the Baltimore & Ohio railroad shops at Glenwood. It is destined for service on the Wheeling and Pittsburgh division, and will head the Cincinnati express. Its number is 838. Engineer James Morris will hold the throttle.

### Marshal McMahon's Death.

The Alsace-Lorraine Society of this city will meet at Hore's hall, Seventeenth street, Sunday afternoon to pass mortuary resolutions on the death of Marshal McMahon, of France. One copy of the engrossed resolutions will be sent to the widow of the deceased, and another to the president of the French republic.

### The Winter Uniforms.

The motormen and conductors have until the first of the coming month to get their winter uniforms, which include a heavy blue overcoat and new winter caps. Several of the men are already provided with their new outfits, and yesterday the company got in a large supply for the others, so that all will have them before the first.

### A Coming Event.

To-morrow afternoon the German St. Paul's church of Triadelphia, which has been completely overhauled and enlarged, will be formally dedicated. Rev. A. W. Werder and the church choir of the St. Jacob church of this city will be present and deliver the dedication sermon, which is being looked forward to by the members of this flourishing congregation with much interest.

### King's Daughters Entertainment.

The King's Daughters, a benevolent society of St. Matthews P. E. church, will give a ballad concert and refreshments at the residence of Mrs. Joseph Spidel on Chapline street, next Friday evening at 8 o'clock. This is an organization that ought to be particularly well patronized by the people of Wheeling, not only for the reason that it is charitable in its character, but because its special attention is directed to the charity that begins at home. A small admission fee will be charged, and refreshments will be extra. All are cordially invited.

### The Bavarians.

The "Baierisch-Wittelsbacher Maximilian-Verein," one of Wheeling's flourishing societies, had a rousing meeting last night, at which Editor Strauff, of the Baierisch Wochenblatt, of Baltimore, made a fine address, urging this society, of which numbers of Bavarians of this city are members, to join the United Bavarian Society of the United States. After Mr. Strauff had completed his address the question was drawn into debate. As various members could not agree the voting upon this question was postponed until their next regular meeting, which takes place in the second week in November.

### The Early Roses.

Last evening the flourishing new "Early Rose Potato Society" had their long looked for banquet and ball in the Tontonia hall. To the music of Mayer's orchestra the merry countrymen tripped the light fantastic dexterously till 11 o'clock they were interrupted by the request of their president to adjourn to the second floor where the caterer Mrs. C. Oberman had arranged a delicious spread. Two bushels of potatoes were used in preparing the potato salad which was devoured by the fifty people present. Dancing was then resumed and kept up till an early hour this morning. The occasion was one long to be remembered by all who attended.

## VICIOUS LITERATURE

Inspires Two New Concord, Ohio, Girls to Run Away

### FROM THEIR COMFORTABLE HOMES.

They Take in the Sights of Wheeling, and are Apprehended at the Behler Hotel Yesterday Morning—They are Finally Returned to their Distracted Mothers, Heartily Sick of Their Foolish Escapade.

Flash novels and cheap, vicious literature have gotten two young girls of New Concord, O., into trouble and brought pain and distress to their relatives and friends. They are May Hammond, aged 16 years, and May Glannon, aged 17 years. They took it into their heads to see more of the world than was contained within the narrow limits of their home, and on Thursday they appropriated \$20 and started for this city. As soon as their absence was discovered, telegrams were sent in every direction. Chief of Police McNichol received notice of their escapade Thursday afternoon, but did not locate them until yesterday morning, finding them at the Behler hotel. They were pretty badly frightened when he took them to the city building. They fell on their knees and begged the chief not to put them behind the bars. After questioning them and finding that they were girls of respectable parents, and that they had been guilty of no impropriety; and that their action in running away from home was nothing more than a foolish desire to see more of the world, inspired by cheap novels, he concluded to keep them in his office until their relatives arrived.

Their conduct at the Behler hotel was above reproach, both having retired at 8 o'clock. They were modest in their demeanor, and gave no evidence of being inclined to "touriness." They are well educated, and were pupils of the High school of New Concord. The fathers of the girls are dead, Miss Hammond's father having been pastor of the Presbyterian church at New Concord. Prof. L. J. Graham, of Muskingum college, has telegraphed that he will come after the runaways and escort them home to their distracted mothers, where they seem very willing to go.
