In the absence of a quorum of council, John Kenny yesterday appointed his brother William Kenny as marketmaster of the Second ward market. In the interim the old bondsmen were responsible, but to show their good faith they last evening went on a new bond for the new official.

Contracts Let.

At a meeting of the Martin's Ferry council last evening several contracts for public improvements were let, including the paving of Second street from Hanover to Walnut to C. T. Cochran at his bid, which was seven cents a yard less than his two competitors. The contract for the sewerage on Pearl and Indian streets was let to Koehline & Conley, and on Zane street to J. F. Stringer.

The Warman Lectures.

The lectures and readings of Prof. Warman at the Y. M. C. A. are literary events of magnitude. The subject for to-morrow evening will be the Deist philosophy of expression. Friday evening a critical analysis of Poe's "Kaven" will be given, and on Saturday evening readings, recitations and impersonations will be given from standard authors.

Yesterday's Police Court.

Mayor Caldwell had a moderate sized audience before him yesterday morning. Jerry Carroll and M. W. Frame were fined \$1 and costs for drunkenness. Charles Lenoy, for carrying concealed weapons, was charged \$5 and costs, and the charge against him of disorder was dismissed. Joe Schempi, for abusing his family, was given a lecture by the court and let go on the promise of doing better in the future. Len Reynolds was sent up for thirty days for drunkenness.

Prospects for OIL.

"The people" south of Bellaire are beginning to get enthused over the prospect of securing gas and oil. Capt. Smith sunk a well for water not over two hundred yards back from the river, but instead of getting water to use they struck a flow of salt water and gas, and the oil experts in that vicinity say he is going through the oil rock. A cannon was arranged for, and a salute of twenty-five guns will be fired from Mozart hill in the morning.
