LAST NIGHT'S BIG HAUL.

Seven Women and Six Men Found in a House of Ill Fame.

It has been some time since a county raid was made on any of the houses of ill fame. The spell was broken last night, when, on warrants issued by Squire Dunning, Constables Cowan and Love pulled the Ella Miller house on Alley C. Besides the landlady five girls were found and six men. The latter were out of town people, several of them from Taylorstown. The owner of the house, Mrs. John Bradford, was also present, charged with renting her house for immoral purposes. The business took place in the jail office.

Mrs. Bradford and Ella Miller gave bond for their appearance before the justice this evening at 7 o'clock. The five girls, whose names were given as Ida Foster, Ella Woods, Nellie Woomer, Lena Logan and Bessie Moro, were also released on bond for appearance at the same hour.

The men, who in appearance were much above the usual run of people caught in houses of this character, knew nobody in the city and with one exception had to remain in jail. The exception was fortunate enough to have a check in his possession, and paid his fine of \$20 and costs.

BAD RAILROAD WRECK.

A Narrow Escape from a Big Loss of Human Life

ON THE BALTIMORE & OHIO ROAD

Monday Night—Passenger Train No. 46 Went Over an Embankment, but Fortunately not a Passenger was Injured—Trifling Injuries to Train Hands—News of the Accident Delayed.

Passengers who arrived in Wheeling from the west yesterday morning bring an account of a bad wreck which occurred on the main line of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, ninety miles west of Chicago, near Bradlaw, Ind., Monday night about 10 o'clock. The train that came to grief was No. 46 out of Chicago. The train was going at a high rate of speed when a broken rail threw every car off the rails, and after going a considerable distance over the ties all the cars of the train tumbled over an embankment, a distance of about ten feet. Fortunately when the train went over the embankment the speed had been considerably slackened, and as a consequence the results were not nearly so bad as they would surely have been otherwise. The passengers were all more or less bruised, but no serious injuries were reported. A gentleman now in the city was among the first to emerge from the overturned cars. Before the wreck he had a lighted cigar between his lips, and unconsciously he still was smoking when he crawled out from the wreck. A train hand made the remark, "That man isn't hurt, I guess."

The engineer and fireman both sustained trifling injuries, and the baggage-master had a thumb broken. Traffic on the main line was delayed until 2 o'clock yesterday morning, and in the meantime a wrecking train put things in shape. For some reason the newspapers had thus far failed to hear of the wreck.

Sudden Death Yesterday.

Mrs. Henry Bremer died suddenly yesterday morning at her home in Moundsville, aged 25 years. She was a sister of Charles J. Eliz, of this city, and her maiden name was Emma Eliz. She was married to Mr. Bremer a little over a year ago. A child four weeks old survives her. The bereaved family has the deepest sympathy of a host of friends.
