A LIVELY ROW

Between White and Indian Soldiers at Fort Omaha.

OMAHA, NEB., Feb. 2.—There was a lively fight last night at Fort Omaha between the white and Indian soldiers and as a result half a dozen of red skins are now in the hospital. Red blood has existed for some time between the white and red troops and last evening a number of white soldiers attacked several of the Indians and gave them a good whipping. The Indians went to their quarters and aroused their comrades. Nearly every red soldier in the barracks grabbed the first thing at hand and sallied out. They rushed into the rear door of Ketchum's saloon just outside the post and waved their clubs, pokers and broomsticks. Fortunately only a few persons were in the place and they beat a hasty exit. Only one white soldier so far as known was hurt in the melee. The guards were called out, and the Indians driven back to their quarters.

RECEIVERS APPOINTED.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 2.—Judge Caldwell of the United States Circuit Court just after two o'clock this afternoon appointed J. W. Kinehart, J. C. Wilson and J. G. McCook receivers of the Colorado Midland Railway. These gentlemen are already receivers of the Atchison main system and will continue to operate the Midland as a part of that system.

THE IRON TRADE.

The iron trade is usually considered a very fair business barometer; hence the following from the Iron Age is of value: "During the past week the improvement in certain branches of the iron trade has gained further headway and a fair more cheerful tone prevails. Buyers have taken hold, and it looks as though some of them have already missed their best opportunity." The Chicago correspondent of the same authority says: "A notable change has occurred the past week in the tone of this market, caused by the large transactions in several lines of trade. One railroad company is known to have placed orders divided between Chicago and St. Louis for not less than 25,000 tons of track material, exclusive of steel rails. A noteworthy feature is the attempt of some large buyers to place orders without success at rates prevailing two or three weeks ago, which they at that time refused to believe were bottom. The only discordant note at present is the continued low price of pig iron."

A CABINET TROUBLE.

The Brazilian President Has a Falling Out With His Minister of War.

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 2.—Despatches received here to-day from Rio Janeiro say that the Brazil minister of war has resigned after a somewhat excited interview with President Peixoto. The cause of the resignation is said to have been that the minister disagreed with President Peixoto as to the state of affairs in Brazil and that he protested strongly against the action of the president in prolonging the state of siege. The minister of war is said to have been in favor of a policy of conciliation. The despatches from Rio de Janeiro also say that the government transport Itaipu which recently arrived at Bahia has joined issue with the insurgents and has succeeded in blockading that port.
