

ANOTHER WIFE COMING.

Harry Temple Married Miss Smith in Wabash, Ind.

SHE AND HER SON WILL BE HERE

Some Time To-day to Testify Against her Recreant Husband, whose Right Name is Temple—He is Reported to have Admitted his Marriage to her. Other Criminal Matters.

The new evidence which the state wanted to convict Harry Temple, alias Griffith, of bigamy, will be forthcoming to-day. A telegram concerning his arrest and the presence of two alleged wives here was printed in the Cincinnati Enquirer and was seen by an interested party in Wabash, Ind. This was no other than Mrs. Temple No. 1, who was Miss Henrietta Smith when she married Temple in Wabash early in the 80's. They have four children, and the oldest, a boy of twelve years, is with his mother on her way here.

When Mrs. Temple saw the account of her husband's arrest she at once wrote here to Sheriff Franzheim, and he responded by telegraph, telling her to come on.

It is said that Temple yesterday admitted to a friend that he married this woman, but denied that he had married either of the others. He says he did not go under the name of Griffith, but that that was another man who made a trip with the North Carolina woman who claims to be his wife.

Mrs. Temple No. 1 left Cincinnati last evening at 6 o'clock for Wheeling, so that she should arrive here early this morning. The hearing will take place this afternoon.

Raised a \$5 Bill to \$20.
Yesterday afternoon Ross Evans, who recently came here from Pittsburgh, was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner B. J. Campbell, on the charge of raising a \$5 U. S. treasury note to \$20. After the evidence was partially heard he was remanded to jail in default of \$1,000 bail for a hearing this afternoon. Evans was arrested Saturday in the Second ward by Officer Watson, while he was trying to pass the very bunglingly altered bill.

In Police Circles.

In the police court Saturday morning Harry Vogler was fined \$1 and costs for disturbing the Free Methodist meeting the night before.

Charles Newman was run in Saturday evening by Officer Daum for beating his wife. They are colored and live in East Wheeling.

Bessie Allen and Frank Wilder were arrested early yesterday morning by Officers Creighton and Daum for disorder at Lucy Belmont's house.

To Be Taken to Georgia.

On Wednesday morning Sheriff Franzheim and Officer Jack West will leave for Augusta, Ga., having in charge Robert Davis, the colored lunatic from that state who has been confined in the county jail for several weeks, and who thinks he is a prize fighter. He is in a terrible condition, and the trip south with him will be anything but a pleasant journey.

Got \$40 and Twenty Days.

Robert Spears, who was let out of the workhouse several weeks ago and turned over to the Bridgeport authorities to answer to a charge of stealing a watch from Mrs. Mary Felsing, of that place, plead guilty Saturday to petit larceny, and Judge Driggs fined him \$40 and sent him to jail for twenty days.

Fire Up the River.

The residence of Mrs. Nannie Gillespie, widow of the late N. S. Gillespie, at Portland station, was destroyed by fire Sunday morning at 2 o'clock. The fire was caused by a defective flue. The occupants all escaped, uninjured. The building was a splendid two story frame of six rooms and well furnished. Only a portion of the contents were saved. The business was insured for \$1,500, only about two thirds the loss. Mrs. Gillespie lost her husband two years ago and has four children. She has had a great deal of trouble.
