THE ITALIAN SHARPER.

Suppello, who Worked his Scheme here, Heard From.

HE HAD PLAYED THE SAME GAME

Before he Came to Wheeling in Greensburg, Pa.—The Chief There Anxious to Hear More of Him—Various Other Criminal Matters in and About the City Yesterday—The Groves Case Again.

The following entertaining and self explanatory letter was received by Chief of Police McNichol yesterday, and it caused a hope that the Italian may be caught yet, for if he worked the same game he did here at another place before, the chances are good that he will repeat it again:

MUNICIPAL HALL, GREENSBURG, PA., March 19.

Robert T. McNichol, Chief of Police.

DEAR SIR:—Your card asking for the arrest of Antonio Suppello, an Italian, reached me on last Saturday, and the information obtained from the same was very interesting to me, as the following will explain:

On Thursday evening, March 8, an Italian answering the description given in your card came to me asking my assistance in locating the murderer of his brother, which crime he said had been committed at Denver, Col., in July of last year. He informed me that he had traced his man from New York City to Greensburg, and his story was so well told that I believed the man was honest, and, of course, helped him.

He had a plan, he said, which he thought would bring the man he wanted to him, saying he knew the man; so I helped Suppello to get word to the many Italians who are idle here, that an Italian engineer at the Greensburg electric light plant wanted several good Italian firemen. He was there to meet them. They came in swarms, and he put them to work on trial. This was on Friday, the second day he had been here. That day about 4 o'clock he told me he had heard of "his man," and that he wanted a warrant for his arrest, as he—the murderer—was coming to the plant the next morning. But that was the last time I saw "Alfonso Suppello," as his name was well written on a hotel register here.

The next and last thing I saw relating to this matter was three big dimes with blood in their eyes, and, I supposed, stiletos in their boots as big as cheese knives, howling for Mr. Suppello and six dollars.

I cannot understand what his object was, as he paid his hotel bill and left nothing unpaid here except his firemen. The hotel man with whom he stopped here said he had plenty of money. He must have gone your way from here. If you know anything further relating to him I shall be glad to hear from you.

THE GROVES CASE.

The Ex-Manager of the Metropolitan Company on Trial.

Yesterday morning in the criminal court the case of William Groves, ex-manager of the Metropolitan Insurance Company, indicted for forgery, was again put on trial. A jury was secured without much difficulty. It is composed of Messrs. Frank E. McCoy, W. W. Gilchrist, A. C. Wagner, Charles H. Loeller, W. J. Elliott, Harrison Bellville, John Janke, Charles S. Crumbacker, Charles H. Myers, Edward O'Neal, Henry Morris and Ralph R. Spears.

Mr. Howard made the opening statement for the state, followed by Captain Dovener for the defense. Colonel Arnett is associated with Mr. Howard in the prosecution, as in the former trials. The evidence yesterday did not throw any new light on the case. Captain Dovener read copiously from testimony given before to show that witnesses deviated from their former statements this time. The case will probably consume all of to-day's session.

Go to the Reform School.

Yesterday afternoon Max Vaelker, aged fourteen, Peter Vaelker, aged thirteen, and Earl Newsom, colored, aged fourteen, were arraigned before Judge Gillespy as incorrigibles. They are the three boys who confessed to breaking into and robbing Montgomery & Son's Island grocery three times. No defense was made, and their parents consenting, they were sent to jail to await transportation to the reform school at Pruntytown.

A Paying Session.

In the police court yesterday Lincoln O'Hare and Harry Hollinger paid \$1 and costs each for fighting. Fred Martin was dismissed and Harry Johnson, who picked a fight with him, paid \$5 and costs. Lewis Martin paid \$5 and costs for assault on his father. Hazel Kirke, a plain drunk, went to jail for thirty days in default of \$10 and costs. Ross Winning and Kitty Wilson and J. Snider and C. S. Black, charged with being out at night for improper purposes, paid \$5 and costs each.
