### STREET CAR STRIKE.

No New Developments in the Situation over the River.

#### NO ATTEMPT IS MADE TO RUN CARS.

A Secret Meeting of the Strikers. They are Ready to Negotiate—Mr. Jolly in Pittsburgh—The Men Urge their Friends to Refrain from Lawlessness—The Outcome in Doubt.

There are no new developments in the street car strike over the river. The men held a secret meeting in the Bridgeport city hall yesterday forenoon, and decided to remain out, but they are ready at any time to resume work at the old scale of fifteen cents an hour for a ten-hour day. They say they will not use any violence toward the company's property, and will use all reasonable influence to prevent any violent demonstrations.

No cars were run yesterday, and many of the men have left town for their homes. About forty men are affected by the cut. J. K. Jolly, the manager of the line, left Bridgeport yesterday morning for Pittsburgh, and it was rumored that he was after men, but an official of the company said last night that his business there was not connected with the strike, and that he left instructions to pay the men off, as yesterday was the regular pay day. This was done, and the company has no regular line employees at the present time. The official also stated that the men were not considered discharged, but that they had quit and had made the company no proposition as yet as to what course they would be willing to pursue.

All is quiet on the ten miles of road, and there will not likely be any cars out to-day.

One of the striking employees said to an INTELLIGENCER man yesterday that at their meeting the men had adopted a resolution urging upon their friends the necessity of refraining from any violence or lawlessness. At the same time outsiders express the fear that if the company should attempt to put new men on the line the sympathy of the people along the line for the strikers and the isolated condition of a great part of the line would result in trouble.

A Full House Last Night—Two More Good Plays.

At the Opera House last night Rhea and a very fine company delighted a full house with the presentation of "Josephine, Empress of the French." This afternoon the play will be "The New Magdalen," and this evening the thrilling drama, "La Gioconda."

In the New Magdalen Rhea wears some of the most beautiful gowns ever seen on the stage. In the language of the Washington girls, who witnessed the Saturday matinee performance, they simply took their breath away. One is a white crape skirt draped over a white satin puffed petticoat. The white crape is embroidered with satin dots, which enhances the brilliancy of the material. The corsage is cut a little low around the neck and is finished with a small ruching of chiffon. The basque is full after the fashion. A broad white satin ribbon runs from the left shoulder across the corsage and terminates at the waist in a bow. The high puffed sleeves are in white satin with a broad ruffle of white chiffon falling to the wrist.

The second dress has a plain skirt in the new material called satin velouté. It is heliotrope. It is cut broad at the bottom. The corsage is in heliotrope brocade satin, with a full basque. It is open in front in V shape and trimmed with the most exquisite duchess lace. The sleeves are very full and on each shoulder is a bow of satin velouté hedged with dark heliotrope velvet. Nothing more beautiful could be made. The third is a princess pearl gray crape. The waist has a grey satin ribbon around it that terminates in a bow on the left side, with three long ends of ribbon hanging to the bottom of the dress. The corsage is draped and fastens across to the left side. The sleeves are very full and long and a simple white lace collar completes this pretty costume.

#### THE GROVES CASE.

The Fourth Trial on the Forgery Charge Goes Right On.

The fourth trial of William Groves, ex-superintendent of the Metropolitan Insurance Company's office here, on the charge of forging a bond for one William Brown, a fictitious person who was represented as applying for an agency, drags its slow length along in the criminal court. Yesterday the state rested and the defense began its testimony. Mr. Groves himself taking the stand. He was still on, undergoing a rigid cross examination, when court adjourned.

Several times during the examination Capt. Dovenor and Mr. Howard had lively spats over points, and once or twice the court called them down pretty sharply.

This morning B. A. Whitson, a former agent who plead guilty to forgery and was sent to the pen, will be brought up from Mountaineer to testify in the case on Groves's behalf.


