The Hill Kind of Democrats.

Senator Hill's plea for protection shows that he is not a Democrat. A Democrat is one who endorses the declaration of principles on which his party stands.

The "principles of Jefferson and Jackson" are good catch-words; but to ascertain the principles of to-day, we must look, not to the speeches and the writings of Jefferson and Jackson, but to the Democratic creed as it is written in its latest national platform.

If protection be prohibited by the fundamental law it is as unconstitutional to protect coal as it would be to protect wool, as unconstitutional to protect coals and cuffs as to protect lumber or pig iron.

In the house the Wilson bill was denounced as roundly as Senator Hill has denounced it, and some of the bitterest speeches in opposition were made by Democrats who found a way to reconcile their hostile views with a vote in support of the bill.

They want protection, as Senator Hill does, and remain in a party which denounces protection and is endeavoring to bring the country to the British system of free trade.

HON. LAWRENCE T. NEAL, of Ohio, says he is out of politics. It happened last November.

Chairman Wilson at Home. Very fresh news from the district of Mr. Wilson in West Virginia, runs to the effect that there is almost no doubt the chairman of ways and means will not be renominated for Congress.

Mr. Wilson will have no trouble to get the nomination. He has only to be in the field and that will make him his party's standard-bearer for the campaign.

After the convention the situation would be different. In that field he would encounter opposition and more of it than he has ever run against.

The belief at home is that Mr. Wilson does not look with pleasure on the kind of campaign in which he would find himself, and that he prefers to keep out of it.

Mr. Voorhies and Mr. Hill were not observed to go out together to see a man after the oration was over.
