### FOOD INSPECTION.

The Terms of the Ordinance Now Pending Before Council.

#### THE POWERS OF THE NEW OFFICIAL

Defined, and Restrictions Placed on the Sale of Inferior Food—The Only Objection to it on the Score of an Empty Treasury—A Much Needed Measure.

The real necessity for an inspector of food in Wheeling seems to have impressed itself on the people generally. No objection has been heard except on the score of increased expenditures at a time when money is scarce and the city in need of increased revenues. The cost, however, would not be an item worth thinking about in comparison to the good to be accomplished in protecting the people from adulterated or diseased food, and so far as it goes the ordinance now pending in council seems to meet the ends aimed at. The only improvement suggested by those who have given it thought is that it should be made more thorough.

The ordinance provides that biennially the committee on health shall present to council the names of three persons deemed fit to occupy the position of "Inspector of Food," and one of these shall be selected by Council to serve for two years. The ordinance continues:

Section 2. That it shall hereafter be unlawful to sell, or expose or offer for sale, within the city of Wheeling, for food, any butter, eggs, milk, whether skimmed or not, cream, beef, mutton, lamb, pork, or flesh of any animal, whether of a domestic or wild nature, or of any fowl of any kind or the flesh thereof, or any fish of any kind or the flesh thereof, or any vegetable or any other article, thing or merchandise used for food, which by reason of any injury, defect, disease, taint or adulteration is unfit or unwholesome for food or dangerous to health. And the exposure of the same at any market, store room or place where articles of food are sold, or in any vehicle used for conveying the same, shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. If any person or firm shall expose or offer for sale, or shall sell for food, any article, thing or merchandise, contrary to the provisions of the second section of this ordinance, such person or the member of such firm who shall expose or offer the same for sale, or who shall sell the same, shall be arrested and brought before the police court of the city of Wheeling, and if upon hearing, the said court shall adjudge such person to be guilty of any such offense as aforesaid, the said court shall impose upon such offender, a fine of not exceeding — dollars for the first offense, and the costs of prosecution, and not exceeding — dollars and — days imprisonment for the second or any other than the first offense, and the costs of prosecution; and the said court may also adjudge the property so unlawfully exposed for sale to be forfeited to the city of Wheeling, and be disposed of as the "Inspector of Food" may deem best. If skimmed milk contains less than 6 per centum of cream by volume or less than 2-10 per centum of fat by weight, and if the specific gravity at sixty degrees Fahrenheit is not between one and thirty-two thousandths to one and thirty-seven thousandths, it shall be deemed to be adulterated.

The inspector is given police powers, and it is made a part of the duty of the police to assist in enforcing the provisions of the ordinance.

The committee on ordinances has not yet been called to consider the new measure, which was referred to it by council.

#### OVER TWO HUNDRED FISH

Caught in the River at the Mouth of the Creek Yesterday.

There was great fishing in the river just at the mouth of Wheeling creek yesterday. The fishing has been good all along the river front for several days, but the luck of those who were angling at the spot named yesterday was phenomenal. There seemed to be a great school of herring there, and news of it quickly spread. Men and boys and one woman were fishing most of the day, and the woman had the best luck of all. She caught over forty good sized fish, and did not fish all the time, either. She lives on a boat house there, and fishes from her front door. She keeps the fish alive in a barrel of water, and sells them when a buyer chances along.

More people watched the angling than were engaged in it, the Ohio River railroad trestle and bridge being well lined. Numerous strings of fish averaging a foot long dangled in the water, and considerably over two hundred were taken. D. R. Brooks caught twenty-nine in a few hours, and then quit fishing because he ran out of worms. It is seldom as good success is met with ordinary worms for bait.

It is said on good authority that on Sunday Conrad Bradley, a well known fisherman of the South Side, caught a cat fish weighing thirty-seven pounds, at the La Belle landing. It is evident that fish stories are ripe, and the late frosts did not affect their size or quality.

#### BUTCHERS' APPRENTICES

Organize and Contract for a Uniform which is a Nobby Outfit.

The young butchers of the city met at the office of the Wheeling Hide and Tallow Association on Sunday and organized an association with Henry D. Bayha as president and James Noble as secretary.

Bids for furnishing uniforms were opened, and that of M. Sonneborn & Co., of the Hub, was accepted. The suits are to be furnished as soon as practicable, and will be composed of white duck coats, brown leggings, white felt hats with red plumes, and silk neckties.

The boys will make a fine display on the occasion of the turnout when the National Butchers' Association meets here in June.

#### FINED \$25 AND COSTS.

G. G. Wall, the Clothing Man, Asks to be Regularly Assessed.

Yesterday morning Mayor Caldwell announced his decision in the case of the city against G. G. Wall, arraigned on Saturday for conducting an alleged "fire" sale of clothing without paying the required license tax. Wall was fined \$25 and costs. Later he took an appeal to the circuit court and gave the required bond.

Yesterday County Assessor Blanchard assessed Wall's stock of goods for state and county taxes. The valuation placed on it was \$10,000. He asked that the city assessor also assess him in the regular way. At the same rate for both city and county taxation a year's taxes


