SOME OF THE CHANGES Made in the Tariff Bill—Complete Back-Down in Some Instances.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 26.—The principal changes to be made in the tariff bill in accordance with the agreement made to-day by the Democratic senators are in the income tax and the sugar schedule.

The principal change in the income tax is a provision for a limitation of the time that the law shall remain in operation. This is another matter of detail which has not yet been absolutely agreed upon.

Another material concession which will be made to the disaffected senators will be the restoration of the specific system in many places where the finance committee changed the house bill by the substitution of ad valorem duty.

It is understood that the entire Democratic majority of the finance committee is in hearty accord upon the wisdom of the proposed changes.
