Came to Wheeling to Marry. Clerk Hook yesterday issued a marriage license to James M. Davis, aged 32, a widower, a native of Clayville, Pa., and Jane Ewing, aged 35, a widow, a native of Greene county, Pa., both now of Cameron, W. Va.

Last of the Season. The Alert Club, of the South Side, gave its final hop of the season at Alert hall, on Jacob street, last evening, and the season's close was fittingly observed by the most successful affair ever given by the organization. Killmeyer's orchestra played.

Bellaire Furnace to be Banked. The blast furnace at Bellaire will be banked this week for an indefinite period. Matters began to assume a discouraging aspect in that vicinity on account of the strike of the coal miners. A number of other industries will close at the end of this week.

In the Circuit Courts. The case of Rhees vs. Norteman was still on trial in Judge Paul's court all day yesterday. In Judge Campbell's court the case of P. Bachmann & Sons vs. M. Merkle and the Wheeling Bakery Company again consumed the entire day's session.

Big Force at Work. The North Main street line of the Wheeling Railway Company is rapidly being reconstructed and a new switch put in at Seventh street. A large force of men, all of them home people, is kept at work, and the line will be ready to operate in two or three weeks.

Two Cases Yesterday. Nellie Homanstaffer, who took morphine night before last, was arraigned in the police court yesterday morning on a charge of disorderly conduct. She was sent to jail in default of a fine of \$5 and costs. John Conners was up as a plain drunk, and was given fifteen days on the hill to sober up.

To Run Thirty Days. The Wheeling Railway Company now has enough coal in sight to run the boilers at the power house for the next thirty days. They have just secured a quantity of slack coal from the United States Glass Company's plants in this city. At the end of this time the company hopes to be able to get coal.

Tentonia Excursion. The indications are that the annual excursion of the Tentonia Singing Society, which this season takes place on the night of June 10, will be the largest attended in the history of the organization. The sale of tickets thus far has been very good. The Liberty, Captain John K. Booth's popular little packet, will carry the excursionists.

Capt. Booth Wou. Isaac Newland, of Martin's Ferry, sued Capt. Booth, of the steamer Liberty, for \$1,800 damages alleged to have been sustained in getting off the boat at Clarington some time ago, when Mr. Newland and a stallion he was leading both fell into the river and Mr. Newland had three or four ribs broken. The case was tried at a jury in St. Clairsville on the ground that the stage-plank of the boat was insufficient, but the jury returned a verdict for Capt. Booth.

Mrs. Cahill's Remains. The remains of Mrs. Margaret Cahill, who was killed at the corner of Sixteenth and Chapline streets, Wednesday evening, were taken to the home of her son-in-law, Mr. A. C. Mericle, of Bellaire, yesterday afternoon and will be brought back to this city this morning at 10 o'clock, when mass will be said at the Cathedral, after which they will be taken to Mt. Calvary for interment. Her son-in-law and daughter from Washington, Pa., Mr. and Mrs. Christman, and children, came down last evening on the 6:50 train.

Lawrence Spiller's Strength. In the account of the trial of Lawrence Spiller, a negro, formerly of Wheeling, for the outrage and murder of Lottie Rowe, a fifteen-year-old white girl, appears this paragraph: Mr. J. L. Beck, secretary of the Bodley Wagon Works, an employer of the prisoner, had seen Spiller lift 675 pounds, and was reliably informed that he had lifted 1,000—500 in each hand. He had had an interview with the prisoner, in which the prisoner said he had spent the night at Painter's, and was aroused by Painter next morning—Sunday. Painter denies this statement of the prisoner.

Mozart Improvements. Mozart Park continues to be a scene of constant activity. The various improvements at this resort are fast moving toward completion, including the bowling alley and restaurant building, which, it is claimed, will be a top-notch, and the one-third mile track around the hill-top. The poles for the electric lights have all been put in place and many of the arc lamps are already fitted on the poles. Mr. Horstman, of the Schmulbach company, expects that the electric outfit will be completed within a week, when Mozart will be a most beautiful spot at night.

MINERS MAY RETURN.

The Etna-Standard Men Said to be Going to Work.

It is reported that a number of miners employed at the two banks at the Etna-Standard mills have decided to return to work next Monday, mainly because the mills are receiving coal from elsewhere. Yesterday fifteen car loads were received from the Monongah Coal and Coke Company and more is coming.

Said a miner last night: "The company is getting coal from other mines and we might as well have the work. They offered and were paying us the convention price and what more should we want? I'm going to work."

Mills Nos. 7, 8, 9, 12, 14 and 15 and the guide mills are running. The puddlers, bar mill, break-down and mills Nos. 10 and 11 are idle. Sheet mill No. 3 and the 8-inch guide will be off to-day. An effort was to have been made to unionize these miners to-day. They have not belonged to the union for some time, but demanded the union wages when the strike was inaugurated and the company agreed to pay the price until July 1. The miners continued to work until they were threatened by other miners.

THE PECULIAR IDEAS

Of a Cameron Crank Who Was Put in Jail at Moundsville.

Henry Pauline was brought to Moundsville yesterday from Cameron for lunacy and adjudged insane by Justice Davis. Following is a letter written by him supposed to be meant for the President of the United States:

MARCH 3, 1894.

President J. P. Hopkins, Esq., Washington, D. C. DEAR SIR:—I managed to jump out of a window last evening and get chased with a shot gun, but finally got down to the railway about thirty minutes after your train had left. As I have only thirty cents left I will be greatly obliged if you will send me a pass to Washington and \$25 (I believe there should be \$100 coming to me, anyhow), so I can get away from here. I hope you will get over your inauguration day all o. k. and find yourself happy. Very respectfully yours, HENRY PAULINE.

The "gentle Annie" Costello got out of jail yesterday morning after serving a thirty-day sentence on a city charge. About ten o'clock she dropped in at McGinley & Devlin's saloon, on South Chapline street, and demanded a drink, which was refused her. She then went out in the street and broke two large plate glass windows with bowlers. The glass cost \$120, and was completely ruined. Officer O'Brien arrested Annie, and Squire Gillespie sent her to jail in default of bond to await the action of the grand jury which convenes next Monday. Annie claims that a man in the saloon struck her in the face because she would not treat.
