## ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH.

The Reopening Services will Take Place To-Morrow.

### DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS

Made on the Interior of This Church. Dr. Swope will Officiate at Both Services—The Y. M. C. A. Services To-day and Sunday—Cathedral Confirmation Services.

After seven weeks, during which time no services have been held in St. Matthew's P. E. church, on Chapline street, the congregation will again assemble there at both morning and evening services to-morrow, at which Rev. Dr. R. Swope, the rector, will officiate.

During these seven weeks the interior of the church edifice has undergone a considerable change, altogether in the way of improvement. Messrs. Stoughton & Stulen, of Pittsburgh, have had a force of artisans almost constantly at work redecorating the walls and ceiling of the interior, which now has a greatly improved appearance. Those who have seen the work done are more than pleased with it, and in fact the work has been done much better than was expected. In addition the floor of the church has been newly carpeted, and in the selection of colors great taste has been exercised. The large pipe organ was taken apart and rebuilt in a different position; it now faces to the side instead of to the front as it was before.

The reopening services will take place to-morrow morning and evening. The morning services are to be at 7:45 o'clock, and the evening ones at 7:45 p. m.

### Junior Epworth League.

The Junior Epworth League of the Wesley M. E. church held a very successful meeting yesterday afternoon under the supervision of the superintendent, Mrs. Crago. After the opening exercises each member present recited a verse of scripture, and it was wonderful how promptly the little folks responded. Yesterday being Missionary day, the collection amounted to \$1.39. The members of the league have obligated themselves to raise \$10 for the support of a missionary in Japan, for which they are to receive his picture, nicely framed, and they are determined to have the picture as soon as possible. Following the collection was the reciting of the ten commandments, the apostle's creed and a lesson in the catechism.

After singing hidden bible stories were in order. The pupils related the story keeping the name of the hero or heroine of the story hidden if possible, while the other members of the league would guess who it might be. The exercise was very interesting. Bible questions were asked by the superintendent and were answered and discussed by the members. At the close all enjoyed a march through the aisles of the church before starting for home; this they do at every meeting. The league has a membership of more than one hundred and a good work is being done.

### At the Christian Church.

Since the congregation of the First Christian church got back into its own house of worship there have been thirty-five additions to its membership, twenty-five being by letter, one reclaimed and thirteen by confession and baptism, which is a good showing for a single month. Such interest was manifested by this congregation in spiritual matters that it was deemed wise to hold a series of meetings, which are now in progress, and will be continued every evening next week. The public is cordially invited to attend. Communion services Sunday morning at 10:45 and preaching at 11:15, to which all are invited.

### Confirmation at the Cathedral.

At the Cathedral yesterday the class of youth which has been in training for some time received holy communion for the first time, and last night the members and a few adults were confirmed by Right Rev. Bishop Donahue. The Cathedral was so crowded that people were standing clear out in the porch, unable to gain admission, let alone seats.

## OHIO RIVER CHANGES.

A New Time Table for Passenger Trains Goes Into Effect.

The changes in the time table for passenger trains on the Ohio River railroad goes into effect to-morrow. Train No. 1 that has been leaving at 7:25 a. m. will now depart at 7:20. No. 3 is changed from 12 o'clock (noon) to 1:15 p. m., and No. 5 (Parkersburg accommodation) will now depart at 4:30 p. m. instead of 4 p. m. The changes in times of arrival are as follows: No. 2 from 3 p. m. to 2:01 p. m.; No. 4 from 7:43 p. m. to 8:40 p. m., and No. 6 from 11 a. m. to 11:45 a. m. The time given above is Eastern (fast) time.


