Local railroad men, who have just completed the preparation of their monthly statements, state that there is a slow but steady picking up of business on the roads entering Wheeling. In passengers carried there is a decided improvement on both the Pan Handle and Ohio River roads.

The Weather and the Crops.

Out in the country the farmers say it is too wet to work crops. Potatoes come up irregular and are growing slowly. Corn is being injured by worms. Wheat is rank and is beginning to head. Pastures are growing nicely. Clover was damaged by the late frosts and injured by an insect which bores into the roots. Oats look well. Plums are dropping some. It is said that the apple crop will be almost a failure again this year. The outlook for berries is good.

The Weather in May.

According to the observations of Mr. C. Schnopf, the Opera House corner druggist, and government weather observer here, there were in May seven days fair, but partly cloudy; four clear days; twenty days on which it rained. The lowest temperature was 41 degrees, on the 29th, and the highest 90, on the 17th. The average was 63.5, as against 58.7 last year, but in 1892 the average was 94 degrees. The rainfall was 4.12 inches. Last year it was 4.30, and in 1892, 5.40 inches. There were eleven thunder storms last month.

In the Circuit Court.

In Judge Campbell's court yesterday the case of Mrs. Church vs. the city was partly argued, giving rise to the hope that it will come to an end this week.

The case of Haskins vs. Taylor was continued.

S. O. Boyce and J. B. Sommerville, were appointed in the court to examine the clerk's office.

R. E. Gilchrist, commissioner in chancery, gentleman, was appointed a commissioner of this court to settle the accounts of the general receiver, special receivers and special commissioners appointed, and acting under the orders of this court.

A DESERTED WOMAN.

Mrs. Frances Taylor, of Pittsburgh, Attempts Suicide.

SHE TOOK A DOUBLE-TRACK ROUTE.

First Swallowing a Powder and Then Jumping in the River at Bellair. She was Hunting for Her Husband in This City Yesterday Afternoon. The Woman's Life Despaired of.

Yesterday afternoon a woman, who it became known later, was Mrs. Frances Taylor, of Pittsburgh, arrived in the city and made inquiries to the whereabouts of her husband, who she said was working in Wheeling. Not being able to find him here she boarded a car on the Island and started for Bellair. While in the car the woman acted in a peculiar manner and the other passengers thought she was in an intoxicated condition. After recovering somewhat she assured them, however, that she was not drunk, but that she was suffering from the effects of a dose of morphine, which she had been induced to take on account of her troubles regarding her husband.

In Bellair the woman left the car at Central avenue, and walked down toward the river. After hesitating awhile she went down the bank and entered the water. Before getting beyond her depth she stopped and swallowed a powder. She then started further on with the intention, evidently, of committing suicide. Two railroad men who had been watching the movements of the strange woman, however, saw what was going on and interfered before she could carry out her purpose. She was taken to the city building, where Dr. Cooper and Long, who had been hastily summoned, administered emetics, but at a late hour last night it was not thought that the woman's life could be saved.


