

CHRIS WOLF, who owns the West Wheeling ferry, will be up in the police court this morning for operating a ferry without paying the city license.

THE 76 volunteer fire department, of North Wheeling, will give a ball in Fulton this evening. The company and the reel will parade over the city at 5 p. m. The boys deserve encouragement.

New G. A. R. Post.

Saturday evening at 6:10 o'clock Holiday and Stephens Post, G. A. R., with its team will go to Moundsville, fifty strong, to institute a new post, which will start off with a membership of about seventy-six old soldiers. After the mustering in of the new post, the entire party will partake of an elegant banquet. The Wheeling people will return to the city on a special train on the Baltimore & Ohio.

A Furniture Dealer Assigns.

Yesterday Alex Frew, the furniture dealer and undertaker, made an assignment to James K. Hall, for the benefit of his creditors. Mr. Frew has had a very prosperous business, but owing to the financial depression cash sales were few and collections slow, and he concluded it was best to make the assignment. His assets are \$72,000, and his liabilities but \$25,190, but several heavy accounts become due this month and he could not realize at once on his assets. He expects to pay off every dollar and start up again as soon as the times brighten.

A Child Killed.

Yesterday morning about 10 o'clock the two little sons of Frank Weeks, who lives near Stinger's crossing, on the Baltimore & Ohio road, this side of Triadelphia, were playing near the track when they heard an approaching train. The older boy told the smaller one to hurry out of the way, and both started to go across the track. The older one got out of the way of the train, but the other, Clark, aged six years, was struck by the locomotive, his head crushed, an arm and a leg broken, and thrown thirty feet. He was instantly killed. The engineer of the train, No. 103, backed the train to the scene, and the body was taken to the child's horrified parents. Some glaringly inaccurate accounts of the tragedy were circulated and printed.

This is the most favorable rate ever made to any similar gathering in the state. It ought to make the attendance the largest ever seen at a convention in West Virginia.

LINSLY CADETS.

The Annual Competitive Drill To-day—An Occasion of Unusual Interest.

The annual competitive drill by the companies forming the Linsly cadet battalion will occur this afternoon at 2 o'clock, on Fourteenth street above Eoff. The drill, which will be unusually interesting, is for the honor of carrying the battalion flag during the coming year, and at the close, after a dress parade, the flag will be presented to the winning company by Miss Laura Caldwell, who has been selected for the purpose by a vote of all the officers of the battalion. Lieutenant J. H. Kohrbecher, U. S. N., who is a guest of Lieutenant Muir, the Linsly military instructor, will be one of the judges. The other two have not yet been selected.

Lieut. Muir, in speaking yesterday of the work of the year, said to an INTELLIGENCER reporter that he was much gratified with the progress that the boys have made and with their general proficiency in drill. He is particularly desirous that old soldiers avail themselves of the opportunity to witness the drill and observe the improvements that have been made over the old tactics in use when they were carrying the musket more than a quarter of a century ago. The manual of arms now in use by the United States army and the national guard is in many respects entirely different from the old Harly and Upton manuals, the improvement lying in the fact that they are much simpler and more graceful, many of the old movements having been discarded as useless and awkward.

Marching tactics have also been improved upon. Lieut. Muir told an amusing story of a veteran who criticized a "wheel" made by the Linsly's when turning a corner while marching in platoons, because they did not march shoulder to shoulder and "turn like a gate on its hinges." Such old-fashioned stiff movements are now discarded and instead there is the graceful, independent swing provided for by the modern tactics.

SEINING AND DYNAMITING.

Indictments Found Against Offenders in Marshall County—Timely Warning.

There has been a great deal of complaint of late about parties seining and dynamiting fish in the waters in this vicinity. Formerly it has been difficult to indict those who have been guilty of breaking the laws in this respect, primarily on account of the indifference of the prosecuting attorneys, but Prosecutor J. A. Parsons, of Marshall county, assisted by the Pan-Handle game and fish association rounded up a number of these offenders recently for infractions of the statutes on Fish creek. He promises to be especially severe on those who have been using dynamite, which is the more reprehensible from the fact that many small fish, of no use to the fisherman, are killed with the larger.

Persons are known to have been engaged in this business in Wheeling creek near this city, and they are advised to take warning, for they will surely be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. This warning also applies to similar practices across the river in Ohio, in which state the penalties are much more severe than in West Virginia.




