WORLD'S CHAMPIONS.

Ovation Tendered Martin's Ferry Hose Team Last Night.

NEARLY THE ENTIRE POPULATION

Of the Town Went Wild With Excitement and Elation—Speeches Delivered by Dr. Ong, of the Fire Department, and Others—The Magnificent Time Made By the Boys at Sandusky Was a Big Surprise.

The world's champions, the Independent Hose Company, were received with open arms on the return to Martin's Ferry last evening from Sandusky. The trip made over the Wheeling & Lake railroad in a special car was the pleasantest in the history of the champions.

A procession was quickly formed and this marched over the principal streets of the city. The first wagon was occupied by the band, the second by the Independents and others by other members of the fire department and friends.

The parade over, a meeting was held on Fourth street near Hanover and largely attended. Dr. A. R. Ong, the chief of the Martin's Ferry fire department, presided and made a neat speech.

Mr. E. J. A. Drennon, who made the trip with the champions, responded on their behalf. He stated that they had the mayor, marshal and health officer of Martin's Ferry with them, and they had to clean up when they arrived.

Mr. Drennon said that the trip had been one whole ovation, that firemen met them at Fremont and Orrville and could hardly believe that the run had been made in twenty-nine seconds.

The speeches were all good and enthusiastically received. They were interspersed with music, and the meeting closed with three rousing cheers for the Independent Hose Company.

Supper awaited the company when it arrived at Sandusky on Wednesday evening, and the boys retired early that night. After breakfasting and parading on Wednesday they took a bath, and after eating dinner rested under a shade tree for the great contest.

The hose races took place at 2 o'clock, the two Fidelity companies running first and Martin's Ferry next. Martin's Ferry ran straight as a die and steady as a clock, finishing as strong as the starting. Martin's Ferry made the quickest and best run and coupling and not a word was spoken during the run except by Dr. J. W. Darrah, the foreman, and H. C. Montgomery, the coupler.

nounced, and bats, canes and shoes were seen in the air. One man offered to bet \$25 to \$1 that twenty-nine seconds would not be beaten, and others offered \$5 to twenty-five cents that Martin's Ferry was the winner.

Nothing was too good for the Martin's Ferry firemen after the races. They were congratulated on all sides. Dr. Darrah, the foreman, and others say their hands and arms were made sore by congratulations.

The slowest time made was thirty-eight seconds, by a Fidelity company, and Mansfield's 36 was next. One Fidelity company made it in 30.

It was generally supposed that Bloomingdale would win the first prize because she has a professional coupler, but Montgomery, of Martin's Ferry, did better work.

The distance run was 233 yards, unreal 200 feet of hose, break a coupling and put on a nozzle.

Robert Edwards, of the Martin's Ferry team, also won a foot race. The Sandusky Register says the Martin's Ferry boys all belong to the Y. M. C. A., and entering the city they asked where the Y. M. C. A., could be found and were taken there, each bathed and went to bed early and they were picked out as the winners.

William Griffith will set up the ice cream to the champions. Other merchants displayed all sorts of inscriptions yesterday.


