Iron and Steel Production.

The last edition of the American Iron and Steel Association Bulletin published the manufacturers' statistics of the production of pig iron, Bessemer steel ingots and Bessemer steel rails in the United States in the first half of 1894.

The production from July 1, 1893, to July 1, 1894, was 5,275,567 gross tons, only a little more than half of what it was during the year 1892.

It may thus be seen how seriously iron production has suffered from the general business depression and how widespread is the affection. How Wheeling has been affected may be seen by the

fact that our furnaces in the first half of 1893 produced 66,398 gross tons; during the second half of 1893 the production fell to 15,193 tons, and in the first half of 1894 it was 23,932 tons.

The Tariff Deadlock. The adjournment of the tariff conference to meet at the call of the chairman, and the fact that the Democratic conferees are still unable to agree among themselves, leave the issue between the house and senate conferees almost as far from settlement, apparently, as ever.

Should a settlement be effected on the line of a surrender to the senate, the triumph of the sugar trust will be complete, and the bill which President Cleveland has characterized as an undemocratic measure and a base betrayal of party principles will be adopted.

Matters have reached such a condition that whether the house or the senate bill is finally adopted, or whether it is a measure resulting from mutual concessions, such as, for instance, a modification of the sugar schedule on the one side, and the consent to a duty on coal and ores on the other side, the result cannot give satisfaction to anybody, and the Democratic party will find itself, as deep in the hole as an outcome of its blundering attempt to "reform" the tariff, as if the McKinley law were allowed to stand.

Our old friend "Arthur Middleton," who in times past has been such a sharp thorn in the side of the West Virginia Democracy, reappears this morning with a letter written in his characteristic and breezy style.
