Changes at Benwood Junction.

On the first of the coming month the station will come into the Grafton division and be in charge of Superintendent R. M. Sheats, of Grafton.

South Side Runaway.

A runaway occurred last evening on South Market street at about 5 o'clock. A horse attached to one of the Swift's beef company's wagons was standing in front of T. W. Weitzell's grocery store, below Twenty-third street, when it became frightened and started up the street at a lively gait. It was caught at the upper end of the market house at Twenty-second street. No damage was done.

George Albright's Funeral.

The funeral of George Albright, a well-known roller of the La Belle mill, was held yesterday afternoon from his late residence, at Twenty-sixth and Chapline streets. The services were conducted by Rev. Hoh. of Zion's German Evangelical church. The interment was at Mt. Zion's cemetery. The German Kroiger Verein and the Bavarian society of which the deceased was a member, both attended the services in a body, headed by Mayer's band.

Bridgeport Gets It.

The Democrats in the over-the-river district have finally determined upon Bridgeport as the place and September 12 as the time for their congressional convention. The proportion of delegates in the several counties is as follows: Belmont, with 5,267 Democratic votes, 53 delegates; Carroll, 1,910 votes, 16 delegates; Harrison, 1,848 votes, 18 delegates; Jefferson, 2,548 votes, 25 delegates; Monroe, 3,203 votes, 32 delegates.

A Butcher Assizes.

Yesterday Clerk Hook admitted to record deed of assignment by which Fritz Luikert, in consideration of \$5 and the performance of certain trusts, transfers to Lawrence E. Sands, for the benefit of his creditors, the horses, wagons, harness, tools and machinery used by him in the butchering business at Fulton. The assignment is more particularly made to meet two notes made by Luikert and endorsed by Goodhue & Thomas.

Still Business Keeps Up.

In the police court yesterday morning Harry Tippet, charged with disorder, was dismissed. Hulda Alexander got thirty days on the same charge, and Foster Merritt paid \$1 and costs for the same offense. William Dixon, a vag, went up for thirty days, and Thomas Maley, drunk, went to the hill. Emma Gessler, out after nightfall for immoral purposes, paid \$5 and costs. Pat Quilligan, for disorder, paid \$10 and costs, and James Manley, John Belz and John Mackey, on the same charge, paid \$5 and costs each.

A Prosperous Council.

Island Council No. 4, O. U. A. M., is in a flourishing condition, having increased its membership considerably under the present dispensation, and prospects for the future are bright. This week the council is being represented by delegates H. W. Wood, Ed. Grosscurth and E. W. Franko at the state council, which convenes at Parkersburg. The officers request each brother to be present at the regular meeting of the council August 29, as the delegates will have some very important business to transact, and as usual some interesting features of the trip to relate.

BENWOOD TAXPAYERS

Will Demand an Independent School District for

THE BENEFIT OF THEIR CHILDREN.

Much Dissatisfaction With the Present Arrangements—Benwood Pays Most of the Taxes and Wants a Fair Division—Public Sentiment in Favor of the Change—The Committee in Charge.

The citizens of Benwood are now thoroughly aroused over the question of securing a separate school district for the corporation. There has been much complaint and a general dissatisfaction as to the present system now in vogue in that district. The people who reside in the town above the railroad have been compelled to accompany their small children part way to the school building, and as a consequence many Benwood children have been sent to the Wheeling city schools, and the parents have been compelled to pay a tuition amounting to a considerable sum.

Some time since a committee of Benwood citizens was appointed with a view of making arrangements for better schools. The committee as appointed consists of Messrs. Josiah Sinclair, Thomas Deegan, Jacob Lander, William Brannon, John Thompson, Charles Schnd, Louis Schoen, C. H. Seabright, James Fowler, Albert Smith, Charles Blair and James Moran. The committee drew up petitions to the circuit court praying for the right to hold a special election to vote on the question of separate jurisdiction. A meeting of the committee was held Monday evening, but as all the petitions had not been turned in no definite action was taken in the matter. The meeting thereupon adjourned over until Friday evening. As showing the public sentiment in the matter one of the members of the committee said yesterday that he had met with but two persons who had refused to sign the petition.

The total assessed valuation of Union district in which Benwood is located is \$2,013,329, and Benwood property is assessed at \$1,260,637, McMechen, \$243,982 and the country part at \$502,710. Thus Benwood pays taxes on \$528,945 more valuation than the remainder of the district. The school enumeration for the district in 1893 showed 1,839 children of school age in the district. Of this number 928 were in Benwood and 911 in the district outside of Benwood. The total cost of education for the district was \$7,800, of which Benwood received \$3,850, and the outside district, with but seventeen more pupils, received \$4,010, or \$160 more than Benwood.

The Benwood taxpayers think as they pay three-fifths of the taxes of the district there should be adequate arrangements made for the schooling of their children. The vote of the city is about 700 and the committee expect to get the signatures of at least 740 of those for the new school district.

THE MASONIC OUTING.

On Friday afternoon at 2:30, "The Bohemian Girl" will be repeated. The Elm Grove motor line has made ample provision for carrying the people, and the Park management will extend every courtesy to visitors.
