REPUBLICANS NOMINATE

Two Strong Men from the Fourth Delegate District—A Strong Platform.

COWEN, W. VA., August 24.—The Republican convention for the Fourth delegate district was held here today. J. W. Curry, of Webster county, and George W. Dean, of Lewis county, were nominated by acclamation. Porter I. Lough, whose name was prominently mentioned, was placed in nomination, but withdrew in a neat speech and moved that Dean's nomination be made unanimous. Mr. Lough is one of the popular young men of Lewis county, and made many friends among Webster's stalwart sons by his manly action to-day, and he will be heard from in the future.

It will be remembered that J. W. Curry was elected sheriff of Webster county when the Democratic majority was much larger than at present, and he was the best sheriff Webster ever had. His election is conceded. George W. Dean is a prominent farmer and has been elected several times to office in Lewis county, each time overcoming large Democratic majorities. Neither of these men will be called upon to explain any questionable connection with the Insane Asylum nor the odious dog tax law, of which Andrew Edmiston, one of the Democratic nominees, is the father. After the nominations were made the audience was entertained by the "tall red oak of Braxton," I. M. Wade, and that brilliant and aggressive Republican, W. C. Dorrill, of Nicholas county. The nominating speeches of H. Ad. Hall, of Lewis, and that watchless orator of Webster, C. C. Hamrick, were well received and the applause made Webster's nominations ring.

The delegates were royally received and entertained by the good people of Cowen, Democrats as well as Republicans. Cowen is situated on the West Virginia & Pittsburgh railroad, twelve miles from the famous Webster Springs, and by the good graces of Republican legislation has been from its birth a prosperous town until its growth was recently retarded by injudicious Democratic threats of destructive legislation, backed by the power to execute them.

The convention adopted the following resolutions amid tremendous applause: We, the Republicans of the Fourth delegate district, in our convention assembled, reaffirm our faith in the oft-repeated Republican doctrine in favor of the liberal use of both metals and protection to American industries and American labor, and we heartily endorse the advanced position of the Republican party in favor of more stringent immigration laws, which makes the American system of protection completely protective.

We charge the Democratic officials of this state with so shaping legislation, and so administering the state government, as to make the value of the lands of the farmers decrease one-half in the last ten years, while his taxes have steadily increased. We view with alarm the ownership of large tracts of land by individuals for mere purposes of speculation and we denounce the Democracy for taxing the small farmer at a higher rate than the large tract owned by the speculator.

We denounce the conversion of our state institutions into political machines for the promotion of the interests of particular Democratic candidates. And we charge the Democracy with dispensing patronage so as to subvert the interests of favorites; and we especially and emphatically denounce the employing and retaining of useless and unnecessary employees at the hospital for the insane at Weston, to corrupt voters and to secure their votes; all at the expense of the people of the state of West Virginia.

FINANCE AND TRADE.

The Features of the Money and Stock Markets. New York, August 25.—Money on call easy at 1 per cent; last loan 1 per cent; closed at 1 per cent. Prime mercantile paper 3 1/2 per cent. Sterling exchange dull and easy, with actual business in bankers' bills at 84 1/2 for 60 days; demand and 84 1/2 for 60 days; postal rates, \$1 80 for 60 days and \$1 84 for 90 days. Commercial bills, \$1 84 for 60 days. Stock market, 50 1/2. The total sales of stocks to-day were 10,000 shares.

IT CURES DIPHTHERIA.

A New Medicine From Koch's Laboratory Costs \$1 a Dose.

New York, August 25.—Not since Jenner's discovery of vaccination has there been in medicine a more important step in advance than the treatment for diphtheria which is put forth from Dr. Koch's famous laboratory in Berlin, and which has been introduced in New York by the civil authorities. If the board of health secures the appropriation of \$30,000 necessary to produce sufficient anti-toxine, as the remedy is called, then the terror of diphtheria will have departed.

Dr. Cyrus Edson says if this is done, 1,000 lives will be saved during this year, at a cost of \$30 for each life. Last year, 1,700 people died of diphtheria in New York.

Ten years ago, Laeffer discovered the bacillus of diphtheria. It is as powerful almost as strychnine. Now a student in Dr. Koch's laboratory has discovered how to nullify this poison toxin, as the doctors call it. Briefly summed up, the anti-toxine, that is, the remedy, is the blood from animals which have been inoculated with diphtheria bacilli. This blood is injected hypodermically into the patient suffering from diphtheria.
