From Wheeling a special train will be run daily during the encampment, leaving here at 7 a. m., and leaving Pittsburg on the return trip at 11 p. m.

The Weather in August.

Mr. C. Schnepf furnishes some interesting figures on the weather in the past month, as observed by him. It was fair sixteen days, clear six days, cloudy three days and it rained on six days. The entire rain fall, though, was only 1.43 inch, as against 4.51 inches in August 1893. The rain fall in June, July and August this year was 4.51 inches; same months last year, 11.45 inches. Total rain fall this year to September 1, 18.48 inches; last year for same time, 30.96 inches. There were four thunder storms during the month. The highest temperature was 95 degrees, on August 9, and the lowest 54 on the 5th, the average for the month being 72.9. Last year the month averaged 74.5.
