FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.

A Martin's Ferry Boy Who is a Missionary to China

GIVES A VERY GRAPHIC ACCOUNT

Of the Condition of Affairs About Chefoo—No Danger Apprehended by Foreign Residents on the Coast. The Effect of the War Severely Felt. Some Points on the Chinese Character.

Rev. Samuel B. Groves, of Martin's Ferry, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Groves, writes a very interesting letter from Chefoo, China, to his parents. The Rev. Mr. Groves went to China as a missionary after his marriage, with Rev. Frank Chalfant, formerly of Martin's Ferry, and has many friends hereabouts who are interested in him. Extracts from his letter are given below:

"War was declared between China and Japan and the Japanese consular postoffice from which we had been getting our stamps was closed at short notice. We had to send to Shanghai and as everything is delayed by the war we just got some. We are not far from the seat of war.

"Many of the natives, thinking the Japanese will make war in a savage fashion, have packed up and gone away or sent their families away. There is very little business being done, for all the Chinese owned steamers which run between Chefoo and Shanghai, and are either afraid to run or are engaged in taking troops from the northern part of China over to Korea. Coal has gone up in price, and if the war continues probably other things will follow. China buys most of her coal she uses from Japan, hence the difficulty. She may not have enough to use for her own warships if she is not careful. And this is not because there is no coal here but because the people do not know enough to mine it. We have a young lady missionary in town whose home is at Mt. Pleasant, O. Her name is Murry. Her station is at Ningpo, six hundred miles south of us.

"There is, as far as we can see, no danger to anyone living on the coast as we are. What may happen in the interior if the war goes on and famine prices for provisions come to prevail no one can tell. These people are so ignorant that it would be easy for them to blame any trouble that comes upon them to the foreigners. Most people think the war will not last long. Frank Chalfant, formerly of Martin's Ferry, was coming down to the coast for a visit, but the steamer was taken off to carry troops and he could not come. We had a guest last night who is on his way home to his station in the distant province. He has about a thousand miles of overland travel before he reaches his station, way out among the hills of the province of Shensi.

"He will use donkey, cart without springs, wheelbarrow and such means of conveyance, averaging about thirteen miles a day. His food will be of the coarsest, often will be half cooked and not clean; and he stops at night he will probably have a brick bed in a room without furniture and without floor, while just outside the door in the yard the animals will furnish noise enough and smells enough to keep any ordinary person awake. Fleas, bedbugs and mosquitoes will abound as they usually do about a Chinese inn. As he rides along the road people everywhere will call out to his face: "You foreign devil!" and will call their friends and children to come and see the "devil" going by. When he gets to an inn at night, tired and sleepy, probably half the town he stops in will turn out and fill up his room without the slightest regard for his convenience. They will be offensively curious about his clothes, baggage and everything he has. They will make all kinds of remarks, but pleasant in a language that he understands. And he will have to take it all or nearly all, for to show that he did not like it or to resent it would expose him to danger worse than discomfort.


