DAILY HINTS TO HOUSEKEEPERS. BREAKFAST.—Washed Potatoes. Mutton Chops. Wheat Germs. Apple Jelly. Coffee.

DINNER.—Boiled Macaroni without Cheese. Beefsteak. Potatoes. Turnips. Graham Bread. Butter. Boiled Rice. Apples.

SUPPER.—Biscuit and Butter. Cookies. Baked Apples. Sponge Cake. Milk. Macarons.

Break the macaroni in pieces an inch long. Boil one-half hour and drain; add one pint of cream, and one well-beaten egg; season with butter, salt, and a little pepper.

THANKSGIVING MENUS. How to Serve a Tasteful and Inexpensive Feast on the Last Thursday in November.

"Oh! for some kind friend to suggest menus within my means for a dainty, appetizing Thanksgiving dinner," sighs the economical little housewife.

Little neck clams, being cheaper than oysters, will do for the first course, served in the half shell.

For the third course have roast turkey, small white onions boiled, and served with drawn butter, mashed potato, and baked sweet ones.

Oysters on the half-shell. Cream of celery soup. Roast turkey, with chestnut stuffing. Potatoes mashed and formed in cones, then brushed over with beaten egg and placed in the oven to brown.

A boiled home-made plum pudding with wine sauce, a pumpkin pie, nuts, raisins and coffee, is a pleasant finish to this modern feast.

Or here is still another, quite different from the foregoing menus: Creamed turkey soup. Boiled turkey with rice stuffing and oyster sauce.

A bouquet salad can follow, made of hard boiled eggs, lettuce, only the tender white leaves, a few nasturtium blossoms and mayonnaise dressing.

Or if one wishes a very inexpensive dinner: Bean soup as a first course is about as cheap a soup as can be made.
