The Assembly at the McLure Last Night a Brilliant One.

The musical programme was a top-notch, the soloists including, besides Mrs. Flora Williams, the local soprano, Miss Katherine Baumann, of Zanesville, who appeared at the Park Casino last summer with the Arion Operatic Company.

After the overture by the orchestra, the Arion society gave the chorus, "Das Treue Deutsche Herz." This was followed by a solo by Mrs. Williams, one of Rossini's tuneful conceptions, that was rendered in the singer's best style and aroused much enthusiasm.

The closing feature of the programme was the rendition of "Colon-Columbus," composed by Herman Mohr, of Philadelphia, and first rendered at the Toledo summerfest last summer, being heard there by the visiting Arion members.

The following selections were especially pleasing: "The Sailors' Chorus," "Playing of the Waves," "The Endless Ocean," "The Prayer," "Land," and "The New World." Mrs. Flora Williams, Messrs. F. J. Diegmiller and H. F. Paul were the soloists who gave selections, assisted by the Arion chorus.

Supper was served after the musical features of the entertainment, and then the floor of the large hall was cleared for dancing, which continued until an early hour this morning.

Yesterday the body of Michael Moran, who died at the Blanch mines, near Collier's station, on Saturday, was brought here by Jerry Mead and another miner, and the funeral will take place this morning.

The funeral will take place this morning at 7:30 a. m., and mass will be celebrated at St. Joseph's Cathedral at 8 o'clock. The interment will be at Mt. Calvary.

Moran died very suddenly. He leaves a wife and eight children. His death was very sudden, resulting from cramps. He was formerly district vice president of the miners' union of this state and a very prominent labor union man.

ABOUT THE RIVER.

Navigation is Still Suspended—A Good Boating Season Assured.

The upper Ohio continues closed to navigation, although yesterday the ice seemed to have thinned out somewhat. The river is reported gorged at four places below here and above Parkersburg, and this being known, the river men were surprised at the continued fall as shown by the marks here yesterday.

The packets are all safely harbored. The Charleston-Pittsburgh packet, Lizzie Bay, is at Gallipolis, just below the mouth of the Kanawha, and both the big Keystone State and Ben Hur are lying in the Little Kanawha at Parkersburg.

The probability that there will be more snow on top of that already on the ground is being considered by rivermen in their conjectures as to what the Ohio will do when the inevitable thaw comes.

A good stage of water is assured in any event and if the thaw is of the quick and sudden variety the river in the upper valley will be pretty high.
