BARNESVILLE'S FIRE.

The Loss Foots Up \$83,000 With Insurance Only \$25,000.

ONE OF THE MOST DESTRUCTIVE

Fires Ever Experienced in Eastern Ohio, and the Town is Given a Heavy Blow Financially—The List of the Losses With Insurance—The Fire Started in the "Enterprise" Office and Spread Rapidly.

BARNESVILLE, O., Jan. 13.—A whole square in the business portion of Main street in this place was destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning and the destruction of property was the greatest ever visited upon this community. The fire started in the north wing of a natural gas fire in the novelty store of M. T. Ward, located in the Gunning block, and quickly spread to the Enterprise printing-office, R. M. Gunning's saddlery and harness store, and J. W. Judkin's shoe-store. Going westward the flames in turn licked up R. M. Patterson's grocery, McKeever & Stevenson's jewelry store, the dental office of Baker & Walton in the McKeever block, the drug store of J. R. Lane & Son and the offices of Dr. G. S. and J. W. Wellons, the grocery of Kinney & Taylor, John Hill's millinery store and residence, the residence of Mrs. Helena Meyer and restaurant of her son, Louis Meyer, and was only checked in the western direction by the massive walls of the fire proof Bradfield block.

The weather was bitter cold and a brisk wind fanned the flames, generally in a northeasterly direction, and for a time an appalling loss of property seemed inevitable. It was only by the most heroic work of the fire department and citizens that a large part of the town is not a field of smouldering ashes. The loss is variously estimated at from \$75,000 to \$100,000, and the insurance will not reach one-third that sum.

It is the greatest calamity from fire the town ever experienced and the district burnt out contained a number of the land marks of the place.

The loss and insurance is given as follows:

- J. W. Judkins, on building and stock, \$20,000; insured for \$11,500.
- R. M. Gunning, building and stock, \$8,000; insurance \$2,000.
- E. P. Lee, "Enterprise" printing office, \$10,000; insurance \$1,000.
- M. T. Ward, stock \$1,000; insurance \$500.
- Baker & Walton, dentists, \$1,000; no insurance.
- R. M. Patterson, stock \$3,000; insurance \$1,500.
- Mrs. Sarah McKeever, building, \$3,000; no insurance.
- McKeever & Stevenson, \$3,000; insured.
- I. R. Lane & Son, \$5,000; insurance \$2,500.
- Dr. G. S. and J. W. Wellons' library, accounts and instruments, \$5,000; insurance \$1,500.
- Kinney & Taylor, \$3,000; no insurance.
- John Hill, \$5,000; insurance on building, \$1,000.
- Mrs. Helena Meyers and son, Louis, \$5,000; no insurance.

Other buildings which sustained damage are McKeever's hardware store, K. of P. lodge room, the Albert House, R. Gamenthaler's residence and jewelry store, Reinheimer's clothing store, the People's National Bank, the Bradfield block and a few others only slight. The total loss is \$83,000, and the insurance foots up \$25,800.

Help Asked For.

At 1:30 o'clock yesterday morning a message was delivered to Mayor Caldwell, from Mayor Baker, of Barnesville, imploring the help of the Wheeling fire department in the hour of the town's misfortune. The mayor at once called up Chief Healy, of the fire department, and it was then decided to secure a flat car and locomotive from the Baltimore and Ohio and take the Niagara engine out. While Yardmaster Jamison, of the Baltimore and Ohio was getting the

engine and car ready another telegram was received from the Barnesville mayor to the effect that the water supply had been exhausted and that the fire was under control. That being the case nothing could be accomplished by taking the steam out and the order for the locomotive and flat car was countermanded. Both Mayor Caldwell and Chief Healy were anxious and willing to give all the aid in their power.

Mr. Schnepf expects in a short time to be able to supply the physicians of Wheeling with the anti-toxine, warranted the genuine article. He waited until he was able to secure a preparation that could be relied on, and expects that in a short time his supply will be adequate to the demand.

The Tramp Nuisance.

These cold nights drive the "bums" to shelter, and nightly from forty to eighty of them seek a refuge at police headquarters. Among them are numbered all sorts of cripples and diseased persons. Nearly all are "looking for work" but not one in a score ever really tries to get a job. They are a nuisance, but what to do about it nobody has yet been able to suggest. Last night among the lodgers was a girl from New Martinsville, who was given quarters in the lockup keeper's private room. The problem, what to do with these people is a troublesome one.
