MR. BOTSFORD'S FUNERAL.

It Was Held on Sunday and Was Attended by Many Old Friends. The funeral of the late William M. Botsford, a prominent citizen of the South Side, who for some years has been retired from business, took place from his residence at the corner of Twenty-eighth and Chapline streets, Sunday afternoon. The services were attended by a large number of the deceased's friends, including the Knights of Honor and Knights and Ladies of Honor, of both of which organizations Mr. Botsford was a leading member, having been one of the local organizers of the latter.

The services were conducted by Rev. J. Engle, of the Zane Street M. E. church. A quartette, composed of Misses Emma Anna Hall and Agnes Oline and Messrs. Edward Redman and Joseph B. Hall, gave a selection. The floral tributes were unusually beautiful and numerous. The interment was at Greenwood cemetery, where the Knights of Honor services were conducted by Judge G. L. Cranmer.

Anarchists on Trial. LIEGE, Jan. 14.—The trial of sixteen anarchists, including the notorious Jagolchowski, alias Baron Sternberg, (who failed to appear, as he is now in a Russian prison), was commenced here to-day. The prisoners are charged with being concerned in the dynamite outrages at Liege in the spring of 1894, the most serious being the explosion at the residence of Dr. Renson. Large numbers of gendarmes and other policemen were stationed in court and guarded the approaches to the law courts as a precaution against anarchist outrages.

Crown Prince of Siam Dead. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.—Mahotjotje, Siamese minister to the United States, has written to the state department from London, January 5, announcing with the deepest sorrow the death of his royal highness, Prince Maha Vajirunhis, crown prince of Siam, at Bangkok, January 4.
