

MUST GO TO SCHOOL.

Board of Education to Take Steps Toward Compulsory Education.

THE LEGISLATURE WILL BE ASKED

To Pass a Bill With This Object in View for Wheeling—First Regular Meeting of the New Board of Education Last Night—President C. F. Ulrich Makes Some Valuable Suggestions as to the Work of the Board—Other Business Transacted.

Last evening the city board of education met in regular session, the first, by the way, of the newly elected board.

"GENTLEMEN OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION:—I desire again to thank you for the very high honor you have conferred upon me in electing me to the presidency of this august body.

"We have an excellent system of public schools in our country which gives everyone an opportunity to fit himself or herself for any occupation, calling or position in life.

It has been suggested by members of this board and by one of our principals that we ought to have a law compelling all children to attend school up to a certain age, at least in the independent school district of Wheeling.

"I will also suggest the propriety of introducing physical education into the schools, for which I have always been a hearty advocate.

"Another thought has occurred to me frequently: that in some of the higher grades our pupils are crowded with too many studies. The mind is distracted by attempting to keep itself fixed on such a variety of topics, and accomplishes nothing very thoroughly.

"This brings me to the subject of the high school, which has been so much discussed, so much lauded and so much contended. Many of our best citizens, men of wealth and position, have opposed the establishment of a high school in Wheeling.

tion, except perhaps, restoring that portion of the tax which was unadvisedly taken off last year, to establish an institution that will put us on a par with other cities.

"With this in full operation, having incorporated within it a chair for instructing applicants for the position of teachers in the art of teaching, another improvement could be introduced that has occupied my thoughts for some years. I mean the adoption of a law requiring that every applicant for a teacher's place must first have acquired a higher education than is furnished by our public schools.

"A word about the German language and I will close these few remarks. About one-third of our population are Germans and their children.

Books recommended for purchase by the committee were ordered bought. The bid of C. H. Quimby for furnishing books for the library was accepted.
