MR. HEARN'S FUNERAL.

The Obsequies on Saturday Afternoon Largely Attended.  
Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock the funeral of the late Hon. William L. Hearn took place, the services being in the Second Presbyterian church, and being conducted by the pastor, Rev. Dr. William H. Cooke, assisted by Rev. Dr. R. R. Swope, of St. Matthews Episcopal church, Rev. Dr. James D. Moffat, a former pastor of the church, now president of Washington and Jefferson college, and Rev. D. A. Cunningham, D. D., of the First Presbyterian church. The services at the cemetery were conducted by Rev. Dr. Cooke, assisted by Rev. Mr. Bartlebaugh, of the Hearn Tabernacle.  
The pall-bearers were his sons, Edwin, Frank J., William H., Robert, Julien, Garth, a grandson, William L. Jr., and a son-in-law, Mr. Smith, of Kansas City. The floral tributes, which were furnished exclusively by the family of the deceased, were very beautiful and in great profusion, the casket being literally covered with them.  
A large concourse of people attended the funeral, the church being crowded, and in addition to a large number of carriages, a special train was run out on the W. & E. G. to Greenwood cemetery, where the remains were interred. It has been a long time since any death in Wheeling has caused as general, deep and sincere sorrow as did that of Mr. Hearn.

### IN THE CIRCUIT COURT.

Business Disposed of by Both Parts at Saturday's Sessions.  
In the circuit court Saturday, before Judge Paul, the matter of the distribution of the funds due the late Paigo, Carey & Co., on account of stone bridge construction, came up on the report of Commissioner Gilchrist, and an order was entered holding with the appellants from the county court, and awarding to Wheat & Hancher \$73 50, funeral services, \$30, and to John H. Hobbs, \$5,500, with interest from October 19, 1891. The remaining funds are ordered to be divided pro rata among the following creditors: Waterhouse Brothers, \$455 09; Wheeling Hospital, \$1,100 95; Neill & Ellingham, \$657 33; Ott Brothers & Co., \$556 16; A. J. Sweeney & Son, \$852 09; Wheeling Iron Co., \$637 07; E. R. Hitchcock, \$389 85; Dr. C. M. Friesell, \$650; A. S. Kerr, \$2,500.  
These last named general creditors object to this settlement, and will carry the case to the court of appeals.  
In the case of Beltz, Flading and others vs. John T. Jones and others, the answers of Charles Schmidt, Fred Huppy and Henry Bieberon were objected to and objection overruled.  
Before Judge Campbell, in the case of Nellie Eagan vs. James A. Henry, the motion to set aside the verdict was overruled, and judgment entered on the verdict.  
In the case of W. A. Crawford vs. D. E. Handley and the Crystal Manufacturing Company, the motion for a new trial was overruled, and judgment entered on the verdict.
