ALL ARE HELD IN \$500.

The Four Men Accused of Shooting at Mr. Humphrey

AT THE BUCKEYE GLASS FACTORY

Positively Identified by a Number of Witnesses, and no Evidence Offered on Behalf of the Defense—They all Give Ball and are Released—A Grave Offense Charged Against Them.

The four striking glassworkers accused of shooting with intent to kill Alexander Humphrey, at the Buckeye glass works, Martin's Ferry, were yesterday bound over to court in the sum of \$500 each. Five witnesses were examined for the prosecution and all gave very strong testimony. The defense had seventeen witnesses to prove an alibi, but none of these were put on the stand, and their attorneys asked for the mercy of the court.

Two of the witnesses testified to the identity of all the men, one identified three and two others identified two. Two testified to seeing two men shoot at Humphrey and two saw one man shot at him.

The shooting took place in front of the Buckeye glass works about 7:30 a. m. on Monday, February 4, as Manager Humphrey was about to enter the blacksmith shop. The four men charged with the shooting are Brock Brown, James Dorsey, Charles Otto and Carl Baker.

The preliminary examination was held before Mayor W. S. Kennon yesterday in the common pleas court room at St. Clairsville. George Duncan and S. W. Boyd appeared for the state and J. C. Tallman and W. T. Dixon for the defendants.

Alexander Humphrey, the first witness, said he came down from Steubenville, and he could not get in at the office door, he went up to the blacksmith shop and was almost to enter when five or six shots were fired at him by two of four men who had followed him two blocks, and who stood on the corner of First and Carlisle streets. Humphrey testified positively that he recognized James Dorsey and Brock Brown as two of the men. The shots were fired at him before he turned around and two or three afterward. He saw the smoking revolvers in the hands of Dorsey and Brown, who were the first to run away.

August Kayler, who was employed at Kerr Bros' planing mill, said he was coming from the mould shop in the Buckeye glass works, said he was about to come out of the door when Mr. Humphrey appeared on the outside. He saw him through the window in the upper part of the door, had raised the gas pipe with which the door was fastened, had his hand on the knob to let Mr. Humphrey in and heard and saw the shooting. He testified that two of the men were Otto and Dorsey; that James McCaffrey called on him the morning of the shooting and asked him if he knew of the shooting, if he saw it and knew the men, and Kayler answered that he did, whereupon McCaffrey asked him to say nothing about it.

Lucian Weidman, a night watchman at the Buckeye glass works, who lives on Carlisle street, about thirty yards from First street, said he was eating breakfast when he heard the shooting. Mrs. Weidman was the first to go outside of the house and she exclaimed: "Oh, Lucian, men are shooting at the Buckeye."

Weidman then rushed out and says he saw Charley Otto run up Carlisle street toward Second, Brocky Brown following close behind, and immediately afterwards he saw Carl Baker run into the alley and up to Second street, and James Dorsey ran out on Carlisle street.

The testimony of Mr. Weidman was corroborated by Mrs. Weidman. She was asked if she knew the men, and if she could point them out one at a time, and she did this, naming each of the four.

The last witness for the prosecution was Mrs. Albert U. Moore, who resides on Carlisle street, and whose attention was attracted by shooting, and she ran out. She saw Otto, Dorsey and Brown on the corner; saw Charles Otto shoot in a southerly direction toward the blacksmith shop door at the Buckeye; saw Otto and Brown go up Carlisle street; told Dorsey not to kill anyone and he made no response; saw the smoke from revolvers at the corner. Mrs. Moore was asked if she was acquainted with the four men, and she replied that she knew all of them except Baker. She did not see him there that morning, but had known Otto, Dorsey and Brown for years.

When the state rested the defense retired for consultation. It was decided to go on with the witnesses, but after debating the matter this was reconsidered, and Mr. Tallman stated that no testimony would be introduced. The state having produced testimony sufficient to hold the men, he wished the court to be as lenient as possible, and not make the bond excessive, believing that the men had not shot to kill, but to intimidate, if they shot at all.

Mr. Boyd urged that the bond be made at least \$1,000 each, and gave his reasons, and Mr. Duncan added that he did not ask for an excessive bond; that the men had shot to kill; the crime was a grave one, a felony, and not a misdemeanor, and that the court should fix the amount in accordance with the character of the offense.

Mayor Kennon named the bond at \$500 each, and the men were released on giving surety, William Sabright and William Otto becoming bondsmen for Baker and Otto, Al. Moore for Dorsey and Charles Hoffman for Brown.

REV. FATHER PARK.

Complimentary Mention of his Recent Visit to Parkersburg.

The following kind words for a well known member of the Wheeling clergy will find many an echo among Wheeling people, Protestants as well as Catholics; they are from the Parkersburg State Journal:

Rev. Father H. F. Park, who has been assisting at St. Xavier's church, returned home to Wheeling yesterday. The venerable father is dearly loved by the Catholics as well as many of our oldest citizens, who knew him and were well acquainted with him when he was pastor of St. Xavier's church some years ago. For about twenty or twenty-five years Father Park presided over the Catholic "flock," as he calls them, in this city. He saw his people grow in numbers and in influence. Under his wise administration of affairs the handsome and imposing structure, St. Xavier's church, was built. He takes a just pride in his church in this city and also in the fact that through him and under his guidance it was built and its influence increased.

Many of our older citizens called on Father Park at the rectory during his stay here. He was as much pleased to see them and to talk of old times with them as they were to see and talk with him. About twelve or fifteen years ago he gave up his charge here and went to Wheeling, where he is now vicar-general of the diocese and chaplain of Mt. DeChantal.

Time has changed the appearance of Father Park, but that same warm geniality which made for him many friends, both inside and outside of the church, still clings to him.
