Nearly a Bad Accident. About 10 o'clock yesterday morning, the milk wagon of Mrs. Fisher was run into by an electric street car on McMechen street in Benwood and injured somewhat. Mrs. Fisher, herself, had a narrow escape from being hurt.

They Were Sentenced. Yesterday at Steubenville, Dallas Smith and Charles Russell, the two Bridgeport boys who were recently arrested on the charge of burglarizing the station building of the Cleveland & Pittsburgh railroad at Empire, Ohio, were tried and sentenced to serve four years each in the Columbus penitentiary.

The Beabout Club Branches Out. The Beabout club proposes to get more suitable quarters. It has rented a lot on Woods street, south of Sixteenth, now occupied by the historic "Castle Garden," and will clear it off and erect a fine two-story club house. The lease runs for nine years, and the members of the club expect in that time to show the town something new in the way of club headquarters.

In Squire Gillespie's Court. Dan Reynolds, colored, from Elm Grove, was arraigned before Squire Gillespie and fined. In default of the cash he was sent to jail for ten days. Mag Miller was up on a charge of keeping a house of ill fame, and was required to give bond in \$100 for her appearance in the criminal court if indicted.

Serious Result of a Slight Injury. Some time ago Landon Vere, a little nephew of Mrs. C. N. Taylor, ran a nail in his foot. Inflammation set in, followed by blood poison, and the boy gradually grew worse. Dr. A. H. Taylor was treating him, and yesterday he was removed to the City hospital for more convenient treatment. He may have to have his leg amputated.

The Crematory Damaged. Yesterday shortly after noon, while the high wind was blowing, the southern end of the crematory shed on the hill was blown in, and the superintendent thought the whole building was about to collapse. It is pretty nearly time a new crematory, furnace, building and all, was built, in a decent location, which will be accessible at all times of the year, and not exposed to "every stormy wind that blows."

Ran in by the Police. There will be a pretty lively session of the police court this morning. Wendel Bros., the expressmen, became tired of the behavior of a lot of hoodlums, and swore out warrants for Vincent Frosh and three other boys, named Coleman, Clancy and Shuel. The charge is disorderly. They throw snowballs, rocks, tin cans, et cetera, at the Wendel stables. Officer Babb ran in the boys. Officer Bauer ran in John Manszewski, a Hungarian, and Andy Marshall, as plain drunks. Both had lots of money. Charles Watkins was arrested on a disorderly charge by Officer Trautwein, and Henry Fravel as a plain drunk by Lieut. Cieman.

An Old Pioneer Laid to Rest. One of the largest funerals in this county was that of Mrs. Hannah Shaw, widow of the late Isaac Shaw, Wednesday afternoon, February 20, from her son-in-law's, James Orum, at Sherrard. She was in the ninety-seventh year of her age. She was born at Brownsville, Pa., May 6, 1798, and has been a resident of Marshall county for the past sixty years. She was the mother of fourteen children, and had seventy-nine grandchildren and thirty-seven great-grandchildren. Four daughters survive her—Mrs. Robert Powell, of Wheeling; Mrs. James Keller, of McMechen; Mrs. James Orum and Mrs. John Smith, of Sherrard. She united with the M. E. church in early youth, and has been a faithful member ever since. She was highly respected and loved by all that knew her. The funeral procession was over three miles long. She was laid to rest at Allen Grove cemetery, the pallbearers being six grandsons, Daniel Shaw, Alexander Shaw, Peter Orum, Robert Keller, Hiram Orum and James Shaw.

BUT THE MISDEMEANORS MAKE UP
