AN INSPECTION TOUR

By Pan-Handle Division Officials of Recent Improvements

AT THIS END OF THE PEWIKOY ROAD.

The Transfer System at Caldwell's Run Found Satisfactory—Trestles That Have Been Filled In—The Pan-Handle Passenger Station Removed. Work on the New Electric Road to Moundsville.

Yesterday a party of officials of the Pennsylvania railroad were in the city for the purpose of inspecting the local property and improvements recently made. The party, which came down in a private car in the morning, was made up of Superintendent J. J. Turner, Trainmaster N. C. Dean and Mr. W. C. Cushing, engineer of maintenance of way. The visitors were chaperoned by Freight Agent J. V. Braden and other local officials of the Powikoy division of the road.

The party first went down to Benwood where the extensions and improvements, especially the filling in of the trestle work, were looked at and pronounced satisfactory. Most of this work has been done recently in the vicinity of Caldwell's run. The officials also inspected the transfer tracks which connect the Pennsylvania with the Terminal system. The terminal facilities of the Powikoy have been greatly improved by the tracks recently put in at Caldwell's run. The visiting officials were highly pleased at what they saw and in the afternoon returned to Pittsburgh.

The Pan-Handle passenger and ticket office was last evening removed from the old station at the foot of Eleventh street to new and temporary quarters in the freight depot building at Fourteenth and Water streets, where it will remain until the completion of the new passenger station it is expected, will soon be started, it being thought that the weather will soon be open so that out of door work can be prosecuted.

Work on the new electric street railway line that is to connect Moundsville with Benwood and by transfer with Wheeling, is now being pushed rapidly and it is said that the line will be in operation early in the summer. This will be a convenient road for the Moundsville and McMechen people who have heretofore depended on the steam roads for access to the city.

GOV. MCCORMICK'S ADDRESS

At the Opera House To-morrow Evening on the Nicaraguan Canal.

Gov. MacCorkle's long expected address to the people of Wheeling on the Nicaraguan canal project, with especial reference to its importance to the Ohio valley and contiguous country, will be delivered at the Opera House Thursday evening. The governor comes here by invitation of the Wheeling Chamber of Commerce, and the lecture will be given under its auspices. The admission will be free, and everybody is invited. Ladies will find comfortable seats reserved for them. Many people from over the river have made inquiries as to whether they will find accommodations if they should attend. They are assured that they will be as cordially welcomed as any West Virginian, and no doubt the governor would be gratified to have a large number of Ohio people among his audience.

The lecture, as has already been explained, is illustrated with large colored maps. The governor has always taken an especial interest in the canal project, and his talk is worthy of the attention of everybody.

REV. MR. GROVES.

Formerly of Martin's Ferry, Now at China, is Coming Home to Rest.

Yesterday a letter was received from Rev. Samuel B. Groves, who is located at Cheo Foo, China, saying his health continues to fail and that he will return to the United States and remain one year. He thinks he can build himself up in that time. The letter, which was mailed five weeks ago, stated that he would leave China in ten weeks from that time and arrive in Martin's Ferry the latter part of April or early in May. The Rev. Mr. Groves is a son of Mr. M. B. Groves, of Martin's Ferry, and was educated in the Martin's Ferry schools and Wooster College.

He went to China as a missionary with two sons of Rev. G. W. Chalfant, formerly of Martin's Ferry, after his marriage, and was obliged to give up active missionary work some time ago on account of his health, and since that time he has had charge of a large book store of one of the societies. One of his last letters appeared in the INTELLIGENCER. He says the mail service has been very unsatisfactory since the war broke out between China and Japan. He said very little about the war in his last letter.

THE RESCUE HOME.

Meetings in Its Interest Were Held Yesterday—Two More Meetings To-day.

Yesterday afternoon and evening the meetings at the Hearne Tabernacle, under the auspices of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, for the purpose of creating interest in the proposed Rescue Home for fallen women, continued, and fairly satisfactory results are being achieved. In the afternoon the services were conducted by Mr. Greenwood, while in the evening Mr. Crittenton officiated. The audience in the afternoon was not large, but that of last evening was larger than the evening previous, when the opening meeting took place.

The Rescue Home project is one that should not be allowed to fail, and it is hoped by those who have already interested themselves in the project that the charitably inclined people of the community will see that it does not fail. Meetings will also be held this afternoon and evening, which will no doubt be largely attended.

Brooke was not on the train at the time, but he had in his pockets a number of copies of some of the filthiest things ever devised by the diseased imaginations of depraved men, without the redeeming feature of wit or any other redeeming feature. Nearly all the stuff found in his possession was simply and utterly disgusting. A condensed copy of "Only a Boy" and several vile poems made up the lot. Brooke was arraigned before Squire Gillespie, and in default of bond for his appearance for a hearing to-day, he was sent to jail.
