OHIO VALLEY ROUND TABLE.

The Eastern Ohio and West Virginia Superintendents and Principals Meet Here.

Last evening the meeting of the "Round Table," or association of school superintendents and principals of schools in Eastern Ohio and this section of West Virginia, opened in the Y. M. C. A. building.

The first matter taken up was the use and abuse of text books, and the discussion was opened by Superintendent Duncan, of Bridgeport, who spoke in his usual vigorous way.

Prof. Hammond, of Union school, opened the discussion on "Prize Contests." He was followed by several others, most of whom spoke against the contests in the public schools.

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That we deplore the action of certain teachers in entering contests of popularity through newspaper contests or votes; that we believe such contests are harmful to both teachers and schools, as well as demoralizing to the community in general, and we urge boards of education to place upon them the seal of disapproval.

The Round Table will be in session to-day and to-night, and to-morrow forenoon. To-day the schools of the city will have a holiday, so that the teachers may attend. The schools closed yesterday for the "moving day" vacation, and in nearly all of them special programmes of a very creditable and entertaining character were rendered, and parents of the pupils and other friends of the schools were present in large numbers and enjoyed the special exercises.
