A CANAL TO THE LAKE. A Gentleman Visits Wheeling to Advocate a Plan TO BRING THE LINE TO WHEELING.

Yesterday Mr. G. A. Kariwicz, a civil engineer who has been some time in Chicago, arrived in Wheeling on a mission which should interest this whole community. He has studied the geography of Ohio as it relates to a canal from the lake to the Ohio river, and has concluded that the natural route is from Wheeling. He pointed out to an INTELLIGENCER reporter that by constructing a canal from the Ohio to a small town named Ironton, in Tuscarawas county, O., which is on the old canal, a practical route could be established from the lake to the river, the new line required to be built not being over forty-eight miles.

Apparently, nature has given us all that she possibly could, and now it remains for the people to do their part. Mr. Kariwicz proceeded to show by the map that Cleveland is much nearer to Wheeling in a practical canal line or on a bee line than Pittsburgh or any other point is to any place on the lake. The abundance of coal, coke, etc., to be sent from here by water and of ore and other products to be brought here was also shown. His idea is that a ship canal is not needed. An ordinary canal of good capacity will do.

PROPOSED GAS SWITCH. Action by the Council Railroad Committee Deferred.

Yesterday afternoon the council committee on railroads met to consider the proposal to lay a switch from the Terminal railway, on Nineteenth street, to the city gas works.
