The Late Vote Over the River.

Hon. A. T. McKelvey, the woman's candidate for board of education at St. Clairsville, defeated ex-Sheriff M. M. Scott by a vote of 159 to 101. The number of votes cast by the ladies was 82.

One hundred and ninety-one votes were polled at Belmont for school board, H. H. Kidlow defeating Wheat Belt by 25 votes. Sixty-eight ladies voted. William Jump was elected at Steeple Valley. Two women were elected at Cadiz.

Dr. I. G. Cope was re-elected in Cole-rain township. Twenty-five ladies voted at Farmington.

THE OLD MEN'S CLUB.

Entertained by a Member on his Eighty-Eighth Birthday.
