LOCAL BREVITIES.

Matters of Minor Moment in and About the City.

THE GRAND this evening—"Mystic Mountain."

A MEETING of the council committee on police has been called for this evening.

THE work of excavation at the site of the new Pan-Handle passenger station is proceeding very fast.

FOUR cases were run in by the police last night—a drunk, two vagrants and a disorderly. The last named wore the officer's badge and "raised Cain" generally.

THE Pan-Handle road will run a cheap excursion to the south via Cincinnati, leaving Wheeling on April 30. Another to Texas and southwestern states leaving on April 23.

ALMOST every day new cracks appear in the Atlantic engine house walls. If it were private property it would have been condemned long ago. It ought to be rebuilt at once.

THE company playing at the Grand this week is far above the average. "Prison Bars," as given last night, ought to pack any house. This evening "Mystic Mountain" will be the play.

YESTERDAY'S police court was "a daisy." In it were fourteen cases. One disorderly went to the hill and thirteen cases from a Tenth street house paid their fines of \$20 and costs and \$5 and costs each, respectively.

CHIEF HEALY, of the fire department, has just finished the repairs to the fire alarm bell in the city hall, which has been out of order for some time. If it does not work satisfactorily now the whole machine will have to be taken out and rebuilt.

A Painter's Bad Fall.

Milton Marsh, a painter working for F. M. Hopkins, on Mr. Ed. Holliday's house, fell from the top of a fourteen-foot ladder yesterday while hanging a shutter. In falling he struck the piling fence. He is badly sprained about the legs and his neck is sprained. He will be laid up for several days.

In the Circuit Court.

In Judge Paul's court yesterday in the case of Frank Robrecht vs. the United Banking and Building Association a motion to quash was overruled.

The case of John Thomas vs. Frank Albinger was set for trial on May 1. In the case of Nesbitt & Devine vs. Thomas H. Higgins the motion for a new trial was withdrawn and judgment entered on the verdict.

THE WORK IS STOPPED.

Mayor Caldwell Inspects the Walls Still Standing

AND DECIDES THAT THEY ARE SAFE

The Contract is Therefore Canceled and the Remaining Walls will be Allowed to Stand until the Owners of the Premises Take Action—The Alley and Street will be Cleared.

Yesterday the work of tearing down the remaining walls of the Chapman and Hutchison buildings, on Main street, which collapsed last week, came to a sudden end. Hallock Bros' contract was to demolish the buildings to the top of the windows in the first story, for \$300, not \$900, as a typographical error made the INTELLIGENCER say yesterday. Yesterday the mayor went to the place and inspected the remaining walls. He went up to the top of the building as it remained, and made a personal examination of the walls. He found the mortar or cement in the remaining walls of the Hutchison house as sound and firm as rock. The work of removing the brick was attended with great difficulty, so tightly were they cemented together.

In the party-wall between the Hutchison and Chapman buildings, where the new walls had been built, the mortar was very friable. Pieces taken from between the bricks crumbled between the fingers.

Mayor Caldwell directed the contractors to do no more work until ordered to by the owners of the buildings. The understanding is that the only cost for the work so far done will be the proportionate part of the \$300 contract price. The men continued at work clearing out the debris from the alleys. It will take only a day or two to have all the thoroughfares in the vicinity of the ruins entirely cleared and safe for passage.
