SAFELY OVER THE BRIDGE.

The Monster Dynamo for the Elm Grove Electric Plant Started on its Way.

The work of moving the big dynamo for the Suburban Electric Light and Water Company's plant from the station at Elm Grove, where it was unloaded, to the power house at Sycamore Grove has begun very favorably, and though it will be a tedious job, the worst point has been passed. Wednesday afternoon the big oak skids on which its twenty-four tons rests was pulled on rollers as far as the toll gate just west of the Infirmary bridge. Yesterday morning the slow progress was resumed, and by 2:45 yesterday afternoon the machine was off the east end of the stone bridge at Monument Place. This is the bridge which it was feared would not bear the weight. The result showed that G. W. Abrams, the contractor, knew his business.

The big machine is pulled by two horses. To the skids is fastened a block and tackle, and the ropes run from it through another set of pulleys, and then through a third, so that the force exerted by the two horses is vastly multiplied. What is gained in power is lost in speed, yet pretty good progress was made yesterday.

The immense weight is hard on the hard wood rollers. A number of them were crushed like egg shells. One electric light pole to which the ropes were made fast just at the west end of the bridge was pulled loose, but this was the only damage resulting.

A large crowd, many from town, watched the dynamo being hauled across the bridge. Otto Hess was on hand with his camera, and made several views of it. He has an interesting collection representing the work at different stages. Those interested in the work express their thanks to Capt. Jamison, of the Baltimore & Ohio road, who took out his wreck car and crew and personally aided materially in the work of unloading the heavy castings.
