A GOLD WAVE IN MAY.

The Mercury Goes Down with a Dull, Sickening Thud.

FROST PROMISED THIS MORNING.

A Heavy Rain Precedes the Fall in the Temperature—Damage to Fruit Feared by Many People—Overcoats and Natural Gas Fires Come in Very Handy.

Friday the mercury in the thermometer registered as high as 91 at Schnepf's. People were all complaining of the heat. Last night the same thermometer registered as low as 45, and was getting steadily lower, and the same people were complaining of the chilly atmosphere. Those who had donned their summer clothing—and nearly everybody had—felt uncomfortable, and the wise man changed back to winter garb. Overcoats were brought out and fires lighted.

Saturday forenoon a hard, dashing rain fell. It did not last long, but in the after part of the day several other showers fell. The thermometer got down to 61, and yesterday morning was down to 52. One or two feeble attempts to rain were barely visible to the naked eye yesterday, but the cool air discouraged them.

C. Schnepf, the government observer, had his signal flag out yesterday, for the second time only on Sunday since the service was introduced here. It was the cold wave flag. Mr. Schnepf received a special from the weather bureau saying that the conditions were favorable for a light frost this morning. A great many people expressed fears of injury to the fruit, but it would take a considerably lower temperature to cause a killing frost. The sky was clear last night, which added to the likelihood of frost.

The usual Sunday rush to the parks was not visible yesterday, owing to the chill air and strong breeze. Fair crowds listened to the music at each, but there was no such a crush as on the two previous Sundays.

The open cars were not so popular as they have been for two weeks or so past, while the closed cars were well patronized. Even the snowballs were in bloom yesterday.

Saturday's rain cleaned the brick-paved streets as they have not been cleaned for a long time now.


