Wheeling Men the Purchasers.

The Markle Sewer Pipe Company's property, of Steubenville and Toronto, Ohio, was sold yesterday to John L. Shriver, of the West Virginia Sand Company, and others, of this city, for the sum of \$18,200. The original cost of the plant was \$65,000. The purchasers will immediately put the plant in operation, employing several hundred men.

A New Wheeling Oil Company.

The secretary of state yesterday morning issued a charter to the Whitaker Oil and Land Company, of Wheeling, which proposes dealing in oil and oil lands, coal, gas, etc. The capital stock is \$10,000, with the privilege to increase it to \$50,000. The incorporators are N. E. Whitaker, G. V. Atkinson, A. C. Whitaker and G. W. Atkinson, jr., all of Wheeling, and C. D. Elliott, of Sutton.

Slow Progress in Painting.

A meeting of the city council will be held this evening. The painting of the chamber of the second branch is not nearly completed. The janitor has been put to much extra work by the slowness of the painters. No work was done at all yesterday, and the room will present anything but an attractive appearance for this evening's meeting. The chairs and desks were cleaned by the workhouse force yesterday.

In the Courts.

In the circuit court yesterday, Judge Paul on the bench, the case of Klieves, Kraft & Co., vs. S. S. Bloch, again occupied most of the day. It is now on its fourth week.

The case of Mrs. Sophia Howell vs. Mrs. Julia Behler, in chancery, was argued to the court.

In the criminal court the case of Charles Wilson, indicted for fornication with Grace Grantham, both colored, was set for trial, but Wilson being a married man, the indictment was defective and a nolle was entered.

Mr. J. C. Brady's elegant new residence in the country will soon be ready for occupancy.

The carpenters have begun work on Joseph Vogler's three-story house on South Main street.

Work was begun yesterday excavating for the new residence of Mr. H. F. Behrens, on the South Side.

The cellar of Mr. John G. Hoffman, jr.'s, new new residence on South Chaucer street, is done, ready for the masonry.

Good progress is being made on the pressed brick front of the Lange building, on the corner of Market and Fourteenth streets.

A Wheeling Boy May Lead.

In the New York World of Sunday appeared a picture of the members of the graduating class of 1895 at West Point, with a list of the graduates in the order of their standing. Seventh in the list of 43 is Cadet Schultz, a son of Mr. H. J. Schultz, the well known shoe dealer of this city. He being one of the twelve who stood highest, is entitled to a commission. The World says:

"The graduates of this year are considered a very bright set of young men. Until the final examinations their relative standings will not be assured, but it is probable that Schultz will lead the class. The graduating day, the greatest social event of the year, will occur June 11, and the closing exercises June 12." It is a rare honor to head a class of 43 at West Point, and Wheeling should feel proud of young Schultz.

Last night Lieutenant Supler ran in John Jacobs, who was drunk and had gone into Hague's drugstore, on Sixteenth street and lay down on the floor. Officer Davinney also put in a plain drunk.

WHOLESALE GROCERS.

The Annual Meeting of the State Association to be Held Here.

The first annual meeting of the newly organized West Virginia Wholesale Grocers' Association will be held in this city on Thursday, May 23. Though the association does not expect to compare as a drawing card with the Barnum & Bailey combination, which is here on that date, yet the members expect to enjoy themselves and also transact some important business.

Among other matters the association will elect officers for the ensuing term to succeed those holding office, who are: President, Joseph Spindel, of Wheeling; vice-president, P. H. Noyes, of Charleston; treasurer, J. L. Kuhl, of Clarksburg; and secretary, James Cummins, of Wheeling.

It is probable that nearly all the wholesale houses of the state and many from neighboring cities in Ohio and Pennsylvania who do business in West Virginia, will be represented. The business they will transact relates to the conduct of the business so that there will be as small an amount of friction as possible.

A banquet will be given Thursday night, at which a number of Wheeling people will be present as guests of the association. A visit to the parks and other places of amusement will also probably have a place on the programme.

THE C. L. & W. BLOCKED.

It Has No Terminal in Cleveland—A Strange Situation.

In Sunday's Cleveland Leader appeared the following article, which has considerable interest to Wheeling readers:

An unexpected hitch has occurred to the entrance of the Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling road into Cleveland. The road is completed, the tracks all laid, but the line is yet a stranger. It has not where to lay its head. If its friends would inspect the new property they must take the street cars to Brooklyn and there begin the sight-seeing. There are no down-town facilities, and yesterday afternoon the officials knew not what railway station, if any, it would occupy.

The understanding has been all the while that the new line would use the Erie passenger station at the foot of South Water street. But the Big Four has entered an emphatic negative. It happens that the Big Four owns the approaches to that station, all the tracks, in fact, out as far as Scranton avenue. The Erie has only a trackage arrangement over the property and pays rent for every train hauled to the station. The Erie has no legal authority to invite its connections to use those tracks. The Big Four sees in the new Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling road a competitor for business in the southwest. It has, moreover, suffered a considerable revenue loss through the construction of the Cleveland branch, for previously it hauled the Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling business into Cleveland from Grafton. These two considerations have doubtless deterred the Big Four from encouraging the Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling to use its terminals at Cleveland.

Negotiations are still in progress at New York to satisfactorily adjust the differences, but there was little assurance, yesterday, of success. In fact the Cleveland, Lorain & Wheeling is now pinning considerable dependence upon the proviso in the city charter of the Valley road, requiring that company to extend the use of its terminals to any line that may desire to use them.
