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FIGHT ON THE TARIFF.
Suits to Test its Legality Now Not Improbable.
WHAT SOME ABLE LAWYERS THINK

In View of the Wrecking of the Income Tax—They Say it Nullifies the Entire Wilson Bill—Justice Harlan May be the Populist Candidate for the Presidency.
WASHINGTON, May 23.—There has been serious talk of testing the constitutionality of the tariff law, as altered by the omission of the income tax. There seems to be no doubt that cases involving this question will be brought before the court as soon as possible. The importers who find the duties on the goods they import raised by the law, and the whisky men with the internal revenue tax increased, may join together to test it, while the manufacturers who find the reduction of duties in almost every schedule of the law interfering with the sale of their products, will probably combine to fight the tariff law. It can be seen that such combinations would be extremely strong. At a first glance it appeared as if the statement made by Chief Justice Fuller that the decision did not invalidate the law would preclude such a contest. However, the dissenting opinions of the four justices which brought this point up, Harlan's particularly, together with the belief of many eminent lawyers that if the exemptions of rents, personal property, and municipal bonds invalidated the other parts of the income tax, because those sections would not have been passed as they were had it not been believed the tax would stay as an entirety, it necessarily follows they invalidate the tariff and the other internal revenue schedules, because such schedules were prepared in line with the income tax and duties were lowered because of the expected revenue from that tax. There are many lawyers who hold that there is here a good case and several able legal lights are pointing to enter into such a contest, hoping for glory and remuneration.
References have been made to the ill feeling among the justices over the case. It is now known that conferences were at times devoid of judicial dignity and very similar to a scene in the senate when passion is aroused and feeling runs rampant. Fortunately in the conferences there was no stenographer to report them. The passion and feeling and unjust manner displayed by several justices during the pendency of this case has hurt the court in the popular estimation, as has the political bias manifested in the dissenting opinions. It is, however, regarded as fortunate the decision was not in any sense a sectional one, the justices who overthrew the law being scattered throughout the land—Field, California; Brewer, Kansas; Shiras, Pennsylvania; Fuller, Illinois; and Gray, Massachusetts; while one northern man, Brown, stood with the southerners in supporting the law.
Justice Harlan finds himself somewhat of a hero in certain quarters, and he can now hear the presidential bee buzzing actively around his head. This morning as he walked down Pennsylvania avenue on his way to the court he found his way obstructed by people, some of whom he knew and more of whom he had never seen, who insisted upon grasping his hand and congratulating him on his opinion. The Justice was so flustered that he took a cab and drove to the capitol. Populists are now talking of him as the logical candidate of their party. Another interesting point raised by the decision is whether the \$346,908,735 56 paid the United States under the former income tax law, during the years 1893 to 1892, should not now be refunded, the late income tax, which was based largely on that former tax, having been declared unconstitutional. Two points would operate to prevent this—one being the statute of limitation and the other the fact that the former income tax had been declared constitutional by the supreme court then existent.

PLEADING FOR WRONG.
Some Things That the Free Silverites That Their Eyes to.
Chicago Tribune.
The Atlanta Constitution is pleading for a slump to the silver basis. It says that without any new law the government may lawfully pay its bonds, currency and treasury notes in either gold or silver at its own discretion, and add:
Some people pretend to think that it would hurt our credit if the government paid out silver instead of gold in redeeming its obligations. Yet the bank of France at its discretion so pays out gold, silver or paper, but it does not hurt the credit of France or anywhere else.
The Georgia paper is trying to confuse things for the obfuscation of its readers, just as all the free silver papers and orators do. Its editor must know that the bank of France is not the government of France any more than the Bank of England is the government of England. But the French government long ago stopped the free coinage of silver and the bank of that country does not pay out in silver that is not rated as high in France as the gold of equal nominal value. Consequently if the French bank should pay out to a party in England a lot of five franc pieces it would be very easy for the Englishman to convert that silver into French gold, the only cost of his operation being the expense of transportation and that due to the delay of a hour in effecting the conversion. If the silver five-franc pieces were worth only two and a half francs at home, being at a discount of 50 percent there, such payment would not be attempted. Does the Constitution suppose the bank of France would attempt or think it could afford to attempt to liquidate its gold contracts in any country with silver coins that would buy only half as much as gold coins of the same nominal amount? The mere asking of the question is sufficient to show that to make such an attempt would be fatal to the credit of the bank of France in those countries; and, similarly, if a French citizen had a gold draft on the bank of France the bank could not afford to offer him in payment money worth only half the gold value of the draft.
The free silverites persist in shutting their eyes to the fact that their proposition is to pay only one-half of what they really owe and to use the government as an instrumentality to protect under the form of law without that law would be so dishonest that it deserves to be branded as rank scoundrelism which ought to be punished by imprisonment. Their proposition is that the government shall authorize them to pay 50 percent of their indebtedness and cancel the other 50 percent. They talk and write as if they thought this scoundrelism can be legislated into honesty, that the government can "lawfully" depress the silver dollar to its bullion value and reduce the weights of the gold coins one-

half to make them correspond in the debasement of the currency unit."
"Coin" preaches this doctrine in his like pamphlet. This is what they want to have done and they demand it for the purpose of being able to cheat their creditors. Except the handful of silver miners among them they can have no other motive than this, and it is undeniable that all the people in the United States who do not want to repudiate their honest debts are opposed to the perpetration of this scoundrelism by act of Congress.
The government may do—that is, it has the power to do—a great many things which are not honest, honorable, or necessary, and which would not promote the welfare of the people. It cut down the tariff in 1893, but even the Democrats will not now claim that the action has done good to the country; and an act to authorize the administration to repudiate one-half of the government indebtedness by paying out silver instead of gold would not make such repudiation honest. The citizen who takes advantage of the forms of law to do wrong, who is no more honest than the law allows, does not stand very high in the scale of morals, and it is to be avoided as well as feared. The Constitution ought to be engaged in better business than in teaching such dishonest lessons to the people of Georgia, when the great majority of them would be vastly injured by the carrying out of the policy of semi-repudiation to which it seems pledged. It is a pitiable position to be taken by a newspaper the conductors of which want to have it recognized as a great one, an organ of the people.

FINANCE AND TRADE.
The Features of the Money and Stock Markets.
NEW YORK, May 23.—Money on call easy at 1 percent; but loan at 1 1/2 percent; closed at 1 1/2 percent. Prime mercantile paper 7 1/2 percent. Sterling exchange steady at 104 1/2. Silver certificates 97 1/2. The total sales of stocks to-day were 265,911 shares.
An improvement in the tone of speculation on the stock exchange was apparent at the opening of business this morning and was advanced in the early dealings. Soon, however, a selling movement was developed in Distilling, and it was rumored that a big pool in the stock was liquidating its holdings. This was followed in the stock of 1 1/2 percent before noon. In the afternoon there was a rally of 1/4, but in the final dealings there was a reaction of 1/2 percent. The grainers displayed much interest during the afternoon, and showed gains on the day ranging from 1/4 to 1 percent, the latter Northwesters. Other advances were Louisville and Nashville, Pullman, American Express, Lake Erie and Western, do preferred 1/4, and Mobile and Ohio 2/8 percent. In the list of declines are Distilling 1/4, and Wheeling & Lake Erie preferred and Western 1/4, and Western 1/4, 1/4 percent. The market was steady at the close.
