AN ALLEGED FORGER

Captured by the Wheeling Police Yesterday Afternoon.

BOUGHT HORSES ON FORGED PAPER

Down at New Martinsville—He Claims the Signatures are Genuine—Will be Taken back This Afternoon—Rev. Dr. Swope's House Robbed—Other Criminal Matters.

Yesterday Chief of Police Bennett received a telegram from New Martinsville, from the prosecuting attorney of Wetzel county, asking him to arrest and hold James Lebow, who was wanted there for forgery. Officer Babb found Lebow at his home on the South Side and he was locked up. Deputy Sheriff McEldowney and S. B. Hall, of New Martinsville, came up last evening with a warrant for Lebow, and will take him down this morning.

The two men said Lebow bought two horses from Mr. Hall for \$150, and paid him with a note for that amount, purporting to be signed by his two cousins, Hugh McCloud and James Smith. Both men denied that they had signed the paper, and McCloud swore out the warrant for Lebow. The horses were found here and turned over to Mr. Hall. Lebow had ridden one and led the other from New Martinsville. He declares that both the signatures to the note were genuine, but this statement is not credited.

THE RECTORY ROBBED.

Rev. Dr. Swope's House Entered and Jewelry Stolen.

Thursday evening a thief entered St. Matthews rectory during the absence of Rev. Dr. Swope and his family, and secured considerable booty. It is believed the robbery occurred just before the Knights Templar reached St. Matthews church for the Ascension day services, and Mrs. Swope was standing on the front steps watching the procession. When she went to her room some time later she saw that a jewelry case which had sat on a dresser was open, and examination showed that a gentleman's gold watch, a lady's watch, a diamond ring and two other rings were missing. The value of all the stolen articles would exceed \$500.

The thief must have entered by a back door, and from his making his way straight to the room and to the spot where the jewelry case always was kept, it would look as if he had some knowledge of the house.

The police were notified of the robbery yesterday, but so far no clue to the thief has been found.

"Dukes" Fahy Held.

"Dukes" Fahy is still in jail. There is no possible doubt that he is the man who snatched Mrs. Anderson's purse Thursday forenoon and afterward struck Detective Hook, of the Barnum & Bailey show, in the face and escaped. The time for his preliminary hearing has not been set.

No Criminals to Try.

No grand jury will be summoned for the June term of the circuit court of Brooke county, Judge John A. Campbell, at the suggestion of Prosecuting Attorney R. H. Cotton, having no or-

dered. This speaks well for the moral condition of Brooke county. The News says it is the first time in the history of the reconstructed state that a grand jury has been deemed unnecessary in Brooke.

THE GROCERS GO HOME.

The West Virginia Wholesale Grocers' Association, whose annual meeting was held here on Thursday, held another and a short session yesterday morning and transacted some business of no great importance left over from the evening before. After this was over the association adjourned, and the members who did not immediately return to their homes in various parts of the state went out to Wheeling park with local wholesalers and spent an enjoyable day in an informal way.

The place of the next meeting of the association has not yet been determined. The matter is in the hands of the executive committee, composed of Messrs. Spidel, Maxwell and Baer, all of Wheeling. Some of the delegates who were particularly pleased at the entertainment provided here have expressed a desire to come to Wheeling next year, but it is thought probable that the meeting will be held at one of the towns in the lower end of the state, Huntington, Parkersburg or Charleston.

CONTRACTS LET

By the Board of Public Works for Brick and Sewer Pipe.

At an adjourned meeting of the city board of public works last night the new bids for furnishing the city with crock sewer pipe to be used this season were opened, and the contract was awarded to George Hibberd & Son.

The contract for furnishing brick for street paving was awarded to the Barnard brick company, of Bellaire. This company's bid was the lowest, and the samples stood the tests made by City Engineer White about as well as any of them.

The board's estimates for the street paving and other improvements to be made this year were not all completed last night, but will be ready to submit by next Tuesday evening.






