

B. P. O. ELKS' OUTING.

A Grand Success Out at the Park Casino Last Night.

A LARGE, FASHIONABLE GATHERING

Enjoys Tom Taylor's Pretty Comedy, "An Unequal Match," Presented by Marie Wainwright and a Fine Company—Other Features of an Unusually Attractive Character—The Best to Come.



WHEN Wheeling lodge B. P. O. Elks undertakes anything it is not half done. The large number of members, their experience as entertainers, their enthusiasm and their past record for attractive events given under their auspices makes the mere announcement that the Elks are going to do something on a certain date equivalent to a great deal of advertising by any other organization.

The annual outing last night added to the laurels the lodge has won in the past. It was given at the park, and the central attraction was the rendition of Tom Taylor's comedy, "An Unequal Match," by the popular star, Marie Wainwright, and her fine dramatic company. Strong an attraction as this was, it was but the main incident of a varied feast of good things.

For three hours before the play began good sized crowds thronged the pavilion, the bowling alleys and other centres of amusement about the place, and a promenade concert by Meister's band was much enjoyed. The only drawback was the chilly air. The evening was beautiful, and in spite of the rather inclement breezes all had an enjoyable time.

At 7 o'clock seven cars packed with passengers went out on the Elm Grove

read, and at 8 a still larger crowd was carried. As soon as these late-comers had taken their seats in the casino the Opera House orchestra struck up an overture. The large house was well filled with the cultured audience, while not a few people found enjoyment in bowling and other amusements.

The park was magnificently illuminated with many colored lights, and in spite of the disappointment on account of the new electric lights not being ready for use, the display was like *Katsuma's* left shoulder, "worth going miles to see."

In the audience were many people from the Ohio side and the nearby towns on this side, attracted by the fame of the Elks of Wheeling, the rare beauties of Wheeling Park and the strength of the stellar attraction.

Miss Wainwright on her first appearance was warmly greeted. As *Hester Gracbrook*, her acting was natural and pleasing, and she fitted the part admirably in all respects. The support was good throughout, and the pretty comedy was presented in a nearly perfect manner as is often seen on any stage. The large audience was very appreciative, and the performance was evidently highly enjoyed.

This evening Miss Wainwright and the same admirable company will render a drama, written expressly for her, "Daughters of Eve." In it she takes a dual role, representing twin sisters. It shows the versatility of her art as few plays can, and at the same time tells a thrilling story in a series of situations which hold the breathless interest of all till the fall of the curtain on the last act. The incidental attractions will also be again offered this evening, and the promise of more reasonable weather justifies the prediction that over a larger attendance will be seen to-night.

MORE CONDUCTORS FIRED.

The B. & O. said to Have Had "Spotters" on Their Trains.

A few days ago the INTELLIGENCER announced exclusively the fact that a number of Baltimore & Ohio conductors on the divisions centering here had been discharged, no cause being assigned. Local attaches of the road were then and still are very reticent about the matter, claiming to know nothing about it. The following Associated Press telegram received last night would indicate that the movement is general, and it also assigns a reason, but those who know any of the conductors laid off here will be slow to believe that "spotters" found any just cause to report them.

COLUMBUS, O., May 27.—Seventeen passenger conductors on the Baltimore & Ohio railroad lines west of the Ohio river were discharged to-day. Three of them were Columbus men. The others run into Chicago, Sandusky, Shawnee and Wheeling. The men here boarded at hotels. Spotters are said to have been working on the road recently.

Several of the men discharged last week ran on divisions east of the river.

THE ISLAND FERRY

In Good Shape—Measures Taken to Enlargish the Old Debt.

There was a meeting of the stockholders of the Wheeling Island Ferry and Packet Company last evening, for the purpose of taking measures to pay off the old indebtedness of the company. Dr. E. C. Myers, president of the company, presided at the meeting.

The boat has been making money under the new management and it is their desire to get rid of this debt which was a legacy from the former management, and there is no doubt if this debt can be liquidated that the new company will have smooth sailing. After discussing the matter at some length the president was instructed to appoint a committee to solicit subscriptions, and judging from the feeling exhibited at the meeting the debt will soon be lifted. At last night's conference quite an amount was pledged, ranging as high as \$50.

A Train Attached.

Word comes from Woodsfield, O., that an engine and train on the Bellair, Zanesville & Cincinnati railroad was attached there on a suit by the county treasurer to recover delinquent taxes aggregating \$3,800. It was thought the difficulty would be overcome by last night, by raising the money to pay off the claim.

MARTINSBURG ELECTION.

The Republicans Carry the City and Gain a Congressman.

MARTINSBURG, W. VA., May 27.—At the municipal election in this city today for members of the city council the Republicans carried three of the five wards. Stapleton Proctor (Dem.) was elected in the first ward; George D. Lambert (Rep.) in the Second; E. D. Gardner (Dem.) in the Third; William R. Kline (Rep.) in the Fourth, and Harry Little (Rep.) in the Fifth. Proctor's majority was only one and his election will probably be contested, as several disputed votes were cast in his favor. The Republican majority on the total vote was 72. When the newly elected members are sworn in the council will stand seven Republicans to three Democrats, and the mayor, who votes in case of a tie, is a Republican. This is a gain of one councilman for the Republicans.
