City Finances and the Register.

When the Register finds itself cornered on an issue it falls back on its favorite argument of calling its antagonist a liar, makes a vague general denial of all assertions...

But the INTELLIGENCER does not propose to let its esteemed and courteous neighbor off so easy. To say that the INTELLIGENCER has falsely stated the financial condition of the city is one thing; to prove the statements false is another thing...

To the INTELLIGENCER's claim that the deficit of \$50,000 which confronts council is a legacy from past Democratic councils; that the reported surplus left by the last council had no actual existence...

As a part of the statement of the deficiencies occurring in the gas office, we find the following items:

Electric light bond of 1891 (unpaid) \$5,699.00
Interest electric light bond, 1891 4,229.00
Total \$9,928.00

Owing to lack of revenues the gas board was unable to meet these demands, as it had agreed to do, and the amounts, which should have been paid from the revenues, were taken out of the city's general fund.

Again, in the estimates that are to be met from the revenues of the city for the current year we find the following items:

Electric light bond of 1891 (unpaid) \$5,699.00
Interest electric light bond, 1891 4,229.00
Total \$9,928.00

To arrive at the precise deficiency bequeathed from the Democratic administration of the gas board of 1893-94, deduct the principal and interest of the 1895 electric light bond (\$12,320.00) and we have a balance of \$54,290.15, which should have been paid from the board's revenues.

In connection with the stone bridge debt, it is not out of place here to refer to the fact that the enormous expenditure by a Democratic administration for that luxury was more than double the estimated cost.

There shall be annually levied by the council of the city of Wheeling, at the same time that the annual levy of city taxes for other purposes is made, until all the bonds issued under the provisions of the ordinance are paid, a direct tax upon all the real estate and personal property...

This law has not been complied with and the interest has been paid out of the general fund. The payment of the bonds could be enjoined on this account, if any one so desired.

Still another sample is the 1885 loan. Council provided the loan should be paid out of the receipts of the water and gas boards.

The Register's talk about the extravagance of the present council is nonsense. The only increase in appropriations is an item of \$13,000 for a new Atlantic engine house, made necessary by a botched job of remodeling under the Democratic administration.

It will not do for the Register to answer the argument of those facts by saying they are not facts and denouncing the INTELLIGENCER as a "servile partisan liar."

When leading New York papers refer to Henry A. Wise as the war governor of Virginia it is time to inquire if it wouldn't be well for the able metropolitan editors to read up in the history of their own country.

On March 18 the INTELLIGENCER published an article going extensively into the financial condition of the city, showing that the treasury had fallen over \$50,000 behind in the past two years.

There were no deficiencies left from last year, but, on the contrary, an overabundant treasury.

This grave assertion caused everybody to smile, for it was a rare exhibition of ignorance of city affairs, for even the Register to make. On the 19th of March the INTELLIGENCER published a list of interviews with leading citizens regarding the \$50,000 deficit that had been accumulating for two years.

Other Democrats also expressed themselves in this way. When the Register began its vile partisan attack on the Republican council a few days since it did not dream that it was "putting its foot in it" so deeply.

The Crop Outlook. It appears by the weekly crop report issued by the department of agriculture that the gloomy predictions made so freely recently will not be verified.

The government reports that the condition of the winter wheat crop on June 1 was 71.1 per cent of an average crop. This is considerable of a drop from the condition of a month ago, which was 82.9 per cent.

On the other hand, spring wheat is 97.8 per cent of an average crop against 88 per cent last year and the conditions are better than for several years past.

Taken altogether, the situation is not at all discouraging, and those who were so free to predict calamity earlier in the season will be agreeably disappointed.
