Ten Thousand Dollar Damages Suit.
A suit was begun yesterday in the circuit court at Moundville, before Judge Paul, by John McDonald's administrator against the Wheeling Steel and Iron Company for \$10,000 damages for injuries sustained by falling in a well while in the company's employ, which resulted in his death. A large number of witnesses will testify in the case.

Criminal Court Adjourns.

In the criminal court yesterday the motion for a new trial in the case of D. Goodfriend was argued, and court adjourned to court in court, the decision being reserved. Goodfriend plead guilty on two charges of keeping a gambling house—policy—and was fined \$10 and costs and given one day in jail in each case. The case of Mrs. Porter, for keeping a house of ill fame, was continued until the next term.

A Wheeling Man There.

Mr. P. Bachmann, of this city, was due at Kiel yesterday to witness the opening of the big ship canal. He was armed with papers from Washington providing accommodations on an American vessel, which were procured for him by Hon. W. L. Wilson at the request of Captain Dwyer. It is safe to say there was not a more interested observer of the event than Mr. Bachmann.

A Change of Weather.

Last night a pretty good shower fell for a few minutes. Two or three miles east of the city there was a perceptible sprinkle, though rain was most needed there. In the city the rain fell very heavy for a short time, and a gentle shower continued at intervals for an hour or so. A long, soaking rain just now would be worth thousands of dollars to the country people. Everything is parched, small streams dry and the roads deep with dust.

At the present stage there is not enough water to wash out the creek bed, and the result is a very offensive stench, to say nothing of the danger to health.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Regular Monthly Meeting—Enumerators Elected—A Change of Copy Books.
The regular meeting of the board of education took place last evening with a full attendance. The committee on accounts reported bills amounting to \$323.55, which were ordered paid.

The committee on buildings and grounds presented their annual estimate amounting to \$5,000, being the appropriation for the repairs of the several school houses. T. A. Little's bill of \$52.72, for plumbing, was ordered paid.

The report of the committee on teachers and schools submitted their report, which commends the employment of this same number of teachers as at present employed—125. The committee also recommended the employment of a superintendent of music for the ensuing year. The report was adopted.

The committee on library reported bills amounting to \$163.52, and submitted a list of selected books to the amount of \$32.43. Adopted.

Superintendent Anderson submitted his regular monthly report, as follows:

In the German department, the number of pupils of German parentage, were 214; other than German parentage, 273. The amount paid for instruction, was \$195.

The superintendent also reported the following Graduating pupils entitled to the medal of honor: Amanda H. Phillips, Edna M. Hammond, Paul Green, Mary L. Hall, Lida O. Wells, Maggie L. Hattenway, Bertha M. Fette and Benj. S. Jackson. The following graduates who had high percentages, were named for participation in the commencement exercises: Jessie M. Bennett, Grace Edna Stone, Carrie Hannauer, Jennie C. Beltz, Katherine Weller, Laura M. Shields and Edward Arkle.

Leonard N. Krauter, Katherine Weller, Herman Bremer, Lizzie Cook and Florence Schockelave, were mentioned as distinguishing themselves in the German department.

Miss Annie Wilson, the public librarian, submitted her report, which showed that the total circulation last month was 2,106, with an average daily circulation of 153. The reading room circulation was 831.

The committee on text-books recommended the purchase of Frango models for term study at a cost of \$125. Adopted.

Mr. A. J. Creamer submitted a proposition to reintroduce his copy books into the schools, and after a motion of reference to the committee on text-books had been voted down, his books were adopted.

The board then went into the election of enumerators for the school census, to have the same compensation as last year—sixty cents per hundred names. The result was as follows: First district, Miss Jennie B. Wilson; second, Mrs. Kletzley; third, J. H. Derriss; fourth, Harry M. Ewers.

After squabbling for some time over an unpaid natural gas bill the board adjourned.
