

Brooke County Teachers.

Prof. F. H. Crazo will leave this morning for Wellsburg, where he will conduct the annual teachers' institute of Brooke county, which lasts five days. Among the distinguished educators present will be Dr. Goodnight, who will speak to-day and tomorrow. A large attendance and profitable session is anticipated.

### Charged With Forging.

Yesterday four young mill men were arrested by Chief Bennett and Officer Michaels, on a charge of stealing chickens and other property from George Folmer, out the creek. They had the missing property in a wagon. They agreed to pay all damages and restore the plunder, and Mr. Folmer agreed not to prosecute them, and they were released.

### The Place Closed Up.

Saturday Mrs. Wisenor, of Barnesville, made complaint before Squire Fitzpatrick that her husband had lost money in a crap game kept by Grant & Jones. One of the proprietors was arrested and the outfit seized. It has been ordered to be burnt to-day.

Mansel Mickens was fined \$5 and costs for an assault on Mame Tate, colored. J. W. Watkins was released from jail on \$50 bond.

### Off for Atlantic City.

The Wheeling delegation to Atlantic City including the members of the B. P. O. E. who will attend the supreme lodge meeting there, will leave this afternoon for the Fan-handle road. A special sleeper has been provided, and in addition to the Elks' officers and delegates there will be a good number of outsiders who will take advantage of the low rate of fare and the unusually good arrangements. District Deputy C. R. Tracy has the list in hand.

### Another Very Hot Day.

Yesterday was an exceedingly hot day, the warmest for several weeks. The mercury at Schnepf's reached 94 degrees in the shade. There was a very comfortable breeze stir most of the day. The rush of people to Wheeling park, Mozart park and other country breathing places was very large. The cars were packed from early in the afternoon until 3 or 4 o'clock. The usual crowds of visitors were in the city from Pittsburgh, Washington and other towns on the B. & O. road.

### Will Run Half-Hourly Trains.

It is said that if council will pass the ordinance giving the Elm Grove road the right of way for a loop by way of Fifteenth and Eoff streets to Sixteenth, the company will put on trains to leave each end of the road every half hour, instead of every hour. As the track is now arranged, Manager Weisgerber explains, the nearest passing place possible is at Elk's switch, and for the incoming motor to lie there till the outgoing one passed, or vice versa, would consume eight minutes. The directors have recently been considering the proposed doubling of the train service, and have met with this difficulty. Council will probably be asked to act in a short time.

### Improving the Bellaire Works.

At the Bellaire mill works the foundations for three additional plate mills are now being built, the idea being to make continuous rolls from the steel plant, so that the steel will pass along and be reduced to whatever size of steel plate they desire with one heating. With these continuous mills completed the capacity of the steel plant itself will be practically doubled by putting in ten ton converters to take the place of the five-ton converters now in use. By the time these improvements are ready the old blast furnaces will be able to furnish the bulk of the iron to be used. No estimate of the cost has been given out, but the improvements made and those under way now \$500,000 will not cover it all.

### About the Smallpox.

Some apprehension exists about the smallpox, as several new cases have been reported to the health officer and the houses marked with the yellow flags and guards put on duty. There was some criticism of the health officer made yesterday, and it reached the chief of police by telephone, but Dr. Walden, when called up, resented this and said he was attending to his duties and others should do the same. The chairman of the health committee has directed a meeting of the committee to be called for this evening, and while it is not especially to consider the new cases that matter will naturally come before it.

A messenger from the post house came down town yesterday and said there had been no provisions left for the inmates. Mr. Fred Hapoy purchased and sent to the place enough groceries to last a day or two.

## LABOR'S CELEBRATION.

State Fair Grounds and Mozart Park Contending for It.

### THE SELECTION OF THE LOCATION

For the Celebration Delayed Until the Next Meeting of the General Committee—Arrangements for This Year's Celebration are on a Large Scale—The Amusement Committee is Particularly Active.

Yesterday afternoon at Trades Assembly hall, on Market street, the general committee in charge of the arrangements for the coming celebration of Labor Day in this city, held a well attended meeting, nearly every accredited member being present, with President Riley, of the assembly, in the chair and Secretary Thomas V. Salisbury at the desk.

The principal business up for transaction at this meeting was the consideration of the bid of the West Virginia State Fair Association for the use of their grounds on the island, and that of the Mozart Park Association for their hill-top resort. The State Fair people offered the use of their grounds for \$100, but not on the date of the proposed celebration, Saturday, August 31. Instead the bid provides that the grounds can be used either on the preceding Saturday in August or on the second Saturday in September, just following the State Fair, which opens September 3. The bid also provides that the labor people will sell but one brand of beer.

The Mozart Park Association bid is \$225 for the use of the grounds with all the privileges, bowling, dancing, etc., and freedom to sell any brand of beer desired by the labor people. The discussion of the relative merits of the two bids was greatly prolonged and ended with a motion to accept the bid of the park association. Before this was put a substitute was moved to the effect that action be delayed until the next meeting of the general committee and that in the meantime a sub-committee wait on Mr. Reymann and endeavor to have the fair association put in an amended bid, providing for the use of the grounds on August 31 and liberty to sell the three local beers. This was carried and the committee adjourned.

The sub-committee having in charge the coming labor celebration are moving early and with vigor and the indications are that the celebration this year will eclipse anything before held under the auspices of the Ohio Valley Trades and Labor Assembly. Chairman Richard Robertson, of the amusement committee promises an attractive programme including horse and bicycle races, etc.

### THE OIL TANK FINISHED.

Pumping Will Begin at the Colerain Well, Some Activity Near.

Work on the 250 barrel oil tank at the Gasline well on the Starbuck farm at Colerain was finished on Saturday and the tubing will be put up to-day. Pumping will be commenced as soon as possible. It is not known whether the well will be shot or not. The owners are very reticent and little is known as to their intentions.

One Martin's Ferry man who visited the well yesterday procured two gallons of the grease inside of fifteen minutes as it ran out of the hole, and the oil seems to be of a high grade. He thinks the well is good for ten barrels a day as it is.

A farmer of Scotch Ridge who visited the well yesterday says it is producing a barrel an hour without any pumping. Many persons are of the opinion that the well is a profitable one without shooting.

A Martin's Ferry gentleman who spent yesterday at Colerain said the oil and gas was shooting twenty feet above the top of the high derrick when he was at the well at 11 a. m., but that there was not nearly so much at any other time during the day.

Conrad Cable, a mold-maker in the West Virginia Glass Works, at Martin's Ferry, lives on a six-acre tract of land near the Starbuck farm, and recently leased his place on the one-eighth basis. Last week he was offered \$2,000 cash for a half interest in the one-eighth of the oil found under his farm, and refused the offer. Only last December he offered to sell his farm at \$2,000, being anxious to sell then, but it is not for sale now, though he is out of work.

The derrick is up for the Koehline wild cat at Smithfield, and these parties appear confident of a good strike.

### Oil Operations West of Bellaire.

The Oakland Oil Company have about 1,000 acres of land leased immediately west of Bellaire, bordering directly upon the city limits, and preparations for putting down a well about a mile west of town are being made. The leases provide for sinking a well within ninety days and the time is so near up that they are making preparations now to begin. Beyond the leases of this company other operations will be made at once, and still farther out along the line of the Baltimore & Ohio the land is taken up. About all the territory between that city and Barnesville is taken up now.
