Impressive Services to be Held Sunday Afternoon

WHEN THE CORNER STONE IS LAID.

A Procession will be Given, Followed by the Solemn Ceremonies—Hon. B. B. Doremus will Preside as Master of Ceremonies and Hon. G. W. Atkinson will be the Orator of the Day—The Formal Program.

Next Sunday will be a red letter day in the history of the Knights of Pythias of Wheeling. On that day the corner stone of the new Pythian Castle, on the corner of Chapline and Twenty-seventh streets, will be laid with impressive ceremonies.

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No doubt the exercises will attract as large an assemblage of people as can get within sight or sound. The work on the building so far has made very fine progress, and it will be pushed as rapidly as possible to completion.

NEW JERSEY DEMOCRATS

Nominate a State Ticket and Work Off the Usual Platform.

TRENTON, N. J., Sept. 26.—The Democratic state convention to-day was largely attended. The morning session was devoted to the formal opening, appointment of committees, etc.

The convention re-assembled at 2:30. The committee on permanent organization reported in favor of Judge Howard Carrow, of Camden, for permanent chairman. The platform was then read and adopted, as follows:

"The Democratic party of New Jersey, in convention assembled, declares that we reaffirm the national Democratic platform adopted at Chicago in 1892, and cordially endorse the administration of President Cleveland, with whose determination to protect the people of this country from the evils ever attendant upon the debasement of the national currency we are in most earnest sympathy.

"We congratulate the people upon the revival of prosperity everywhere evident in our land and assert that the industrial depression with which we have been afflicted during the past three years is chargeable to national legislation enacted by the Republican party. The purchase of silver, to be stored in the treasury and the enactment of unjust tariff laws, to enrich a few favorites by the oppressions of millions of consumers were the main cause of the paralysis of our markets."

The remainder of the platform referred to state issues.

The name of Judge Clifford Stanley Sims was withdrawn from the list of gubernatorial candidates, and his support thrown to Chancellor McGill, who was nominated on the first ballot, his opponent being ex-Congressman Augustus W. Guiler. McGill's nomination was made unanimous.

LOVERS DIE TOGETHER.

Shocking Double Suicide in a Park at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Sept. 25.—At an early hour to-day Robert Schmidt, a clothier, discovered the dead bodies of Joseph Renisch and Delia Bowen near the Lindell railway entrance to Lower Grove Park. The right temple of each was pierced by a bullet, which caused a great flow of blood. About 2 o'clock a lady living in the vicinity heard two pistol shots, but did not know who fired them.

Investigation disclosed a note written by the girl in a small memorandum book as follows:

"Good-bye all. I used it for myself and he used it for himself."

Near the bodies was a revolver with two cartridges exploded.

Letters found in the pockets of Renisch, who is a pressman, show that he was about to leave St. Louis to look for work and was most probably going to New York and did not expect to return for two years. They were lovers and had evidently struggled hard to give up each other, but thought death preferable to separation.

Renisch was a married man. Some time ago he became entangled in an affair with a young woman and it is said, was compelled to marry her in court. He never lived with her, however. Lately he has been keeping company with Miss Bowen in opposition to the will of the latter's parents. The presumption is that the couple went to the park and mutually agreed to end their lives.

Miss Bowen was an accomplished daughter of Joseph Ewin, organist and musical instructor at St. John's Catholic church, and was about sixteen years of age. The remains of both were taken to the morgue.
