Wheeling Lodge, No. 23, A. O. U. W., last night had one of the most interesting "social sessions" in its brief but brilliant history. About fifty persons were present and a most enjoyable evening was passed. Martin Thornton had charge of the supper, assisted by C. D. Vernon, of Wheeling lodge. The literary part of the entertainment was of a high grade. Mr. Frank Stanton's essay and Mr. F. W. Nesbitt's recitation were features.

Burglars Down the River.

The store of Disque & Hornbrook, at Powhatan, was robbed Monday night of about \$200 worth of goods. It is a general country store and the thieves took a good supply of nearly everything, including revolvers and jewelry. Suspicion points strongly to a couple of Bellaire crooks who have been down in that vicinity. A handcar of the Ohio River Railroad Company was used by the thieves, but no trace of the goods has yet been found.

A New State Gazetteer.

A Lecture on Equal Suffrage.

This evening and to-morrow evening Rev. Henrietta G. Moore, of Springfield, O., will speak in the parlors of Dr. Harlot Jones's hospital, on Fifteenth street, on the subject of "Equal Suffrage."

Miss Moore has won high praise from many papers and public men. The Chicago Inter-Ocean said of her: "Miss Moore is an eloquent and impressive speaker, her power lying in the fact that her words are prompted by an earnest Christian zeal." Her lecture was devoted to a definition of the signs of the time. She should have, and doubtless will have, a good audience at her first appearance in Wheeling.

Mrs. George R. Taylor Dead.

Last night at 9:30 o'clock, at the family home on Fourteenth street, occurred the death of Mrs. Martha Taylor, wife of Mr. George R. Taylor. Mrs. Taylor has for years been a sufferer from rheumatism, but that had no connection with her demise. Last Saturday she had been very ill and has been very low since, with intestinal obstruction.

The many friends of Mrs. Taylor, who was held in high esteem by a large circle of friends and acquaintances, will learn of her death with feelings of sincere regret, and the bereaved husband and family will have the deepest sympathy of all their friends. The funeral arrangements had not been completed last night.

THE GLASS INDUSTRY.

A Company Organized to Take the Northwood Glass Works.

THE BEAUMONT GLASS COMPANY

Is the Name of the New Organization. A Meeting of the Stockholders was Held Last Evening—A Charter to be Applied for at Charleston. Thirty to Forty Persons to be Employed—Something New Here.

Last night at the home of Mr. Percy Beaumont, on the Island, the stockholders of the Beaumont Glass Company held a preliminary meeting and made arrangements to take out a charter at Charleston. The persons interested appointed Messrs. Fergus Whally, Frank Swift, James L. Higgins, Captain John Smith and Percy Beaumont as the five stockholders to take out the charter. This will be done immediately. The company will start with a capital stock of \$5,000, with the privilege to increase at pleasure to \$50,000.

The Beaumont company has secured the old Northwood glass factory plant in Martin's Ferry, where its business will be carried on. Work was commenced yesterday getting the factory in shape to begin operations as soon as the company can organize.

Mr. Beaumont, the leading spirit in the new enterprise, is a well known glass man. He was formerly connected with the Hobbs plant of the United States Glass Company, but two years ago, with Mr. Waddell, went to the West Virginia works, formerly the Elson, of Martin's Ferry. The company which he is organizing will not manufacture glass, but will do a staining, engraving and etching business, employing from thirty to forty persons. The glazing of glass will also receive attention, and Mr. Beaumont's many original ideas will be in evidence. Free hand decoration will be another feature. Altogether, the new enterprise is something new even in this manufacturing center, and will no doubt prove a flattering success.

TO COMPLETE THE SURVEY

Of the State of West Virginia, the Prayer of Many Petitioners.

The West Virginia Academy of Sciences circulating a petition to Hon. C. D. Wolcott, director of the United States geological survey, for the surveying of the government of 2,290 square miles in this state, which for some reason has remained unsurveyed. Yesterday the petition was sent to this place and will be submitted to the mayor, president of the chamber of commerce and others. The petition goes on to say:

"In view of the important engineering enterprises now in progress in the northern part of the state, including the construction of several lines of railroad, the construction of locks and dams on the Monongahela and upper Ohio rivers, the marvelous and rapid development of the oil and gas fields in these counties, as well as for the general purposes of education and agriculture, the petitioners respectfully request that the counties of West Virginia yet remaining unsurveyed may be included in the topographic work of the next year, and that the maps of the same be published as soon as possible."

The petition is signed by President A. D. Hopkins, of the Academy of Science, also by Vice President T. C. Miller and Secretary W. E. Rumsey; President Goodknight, of the university; Judge Okey Johnson and many others.
