RAILROAD AFFAIRS.

Pewiky Officials Here on an Inspection Trip Yesterday.

THE NEW PASSENGER STATION

Was Accepted, and Will be Occupied and Open to the Public Early Next Week. It is the Best Station in This Vicinity, and a Credit to the Road—Baltimore and Ohio Officials Will be Here On Annual Inspection To-day.

Yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock a special train of two coaches came down from Pittsburgh on the Pan Handle road, bearing a number of the company's officials, including Superintendent J. J. Turner, Assistant Chief Engineer Johnson, Engineer of Maintenance of Way Cushing, Foreman of Bridges J. W. Shields and Foreman of Masons Thomas Frith. Their train stopped at the new passenger station at the foot of Eleventh street, which was thoroughly inspected and accepted of the contractors. The party remained in town during the evening and left late last night for Pittsburgh.

Everything is ready for the occupation of the new passenger station with the exception of the iron railings on the two inside retaining walls and these will have been put up in a day or two, after which Passenger Agent Tomlinson, Ticket Agent Schoen and the other officials of the passenger and baggage departments will move in and the station be opened to the traveling public. The Pewiky has spent more than its appropriation, \$40,000, in the construction of this station, which is a credit to the road and city, and is the finest in the state with the possible exception of the union station at Kenova, on the Norfolk & Western, Chesapeake & Ohio and Ohio River roads. Its location does not set it off to very great advantage, two-thirds of the money appropriated being put under the ground in the shape of retaining walls, etc.

It was given out last night that the station would not be opened until early next week. To-day a party of Baltimore & Ohio officials on their yearly inspection tour of that company's various lines, will arrive in the city and inspect the road's interests in this vicinity. In the party are the following: President Charles F. Mayer, Third Vice President C. K. Lord, General Manager Robert H. Campbell, General Superintendent of Motive Power Charles B. Hazlehurst, General Superintendent of the Pittsburgh Division J. V. Patton, Master Car Builder E. W. Grieves, Superintendent R. M. Shresta and others. The party were at Cleveland on Tuesday and spent yesterday in Chicago. From Wheeling the party will return to Baltimore.
