HAS NINE LIVES.

The Island Ferry Company Resembles a Cat in That Way.

THE MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT

Was Slimly Attended, and the Proper Spirit Seems to Have Disappeared—Several Plans for Continuance Discussed. The Ferry to be Run Free on Saturday if the Directors Allow It—A Committee to Receive Subscriptions.

Last night another meeting of the stockholders of the Wheeling Island Ferry & Packet Company was held on the Island, for the purpose of discussing ways and means for the continuance of the Charleston in opposition to the two bridges. There was rather a small attendance of stockholders and only a small proportion of these seemed to take an earnest part in the proceedings. However, by the action of the board of directors, the ferry will run on Saturday and the special committee will make a last and desperate effort to secure subscriptions to make up the \$50 of the \$5,000 which is at present lacking.

The meeting was called to order by Captain McCoy, who was chosen chairman and Mr. C. H. Watkins, Jr., the secretary of the company, acting as secretary. Mr. Watkins reported the number of shares of the new issue of preferred stock subscribed to be 750, amounting to \$3,750. In addition four of the "One Hundred Dollar Men" have been seen and will contribute their liability to the new issue of the stock; then the supper netted \$350 and other resources amount to \$120, making the amount raised \$4,650, and leaving \$350 to be raised before, according to the ultimatum of the directors, the ferry can be started again.

Several persons present spoke of the work of the committee in soliciting stock and the general opinion was that there would be no difficulty in raising the \$350 if the proper persons could be induced to take up the work of soliciting. Mr. Coen spoke earnestly of the importance of continuing the fight against the bridges and his opinion was that if the boat is once started again the bridges will be compelled to come to terms and offer the islanders an equitable rate of toll.

After an almost unlimited amount of discussion that seemed without much purpose, Mr. Myron Hubbard moved that the directors be asked to start the ferry to-morrow, run it all day free of toll, and that a committee be appointed to remain on the boat during the day and solicit subscriptions to preferred stock from those islanders—they are many, by the way—who have not already subscribed. The motion also provided that if the \$350 is not subscribed the boat be tied up again.

Chairman McCoy appointed these gentlemen on the committee: N. C. Hamilton, C. H. Watkins, Jr., J. A. Lash, R. K. Giffen, C. E. Gee, George Zimmer and T. C. Wilson.
